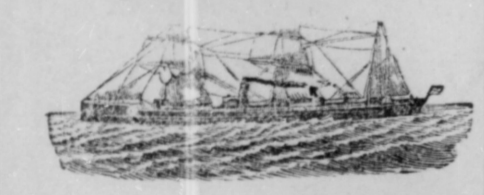

The Transvaal War

War Notes.

Mr. Rudyard Kipling has donated £20 and some books to the fund for fitting out the hospital ship Maine.

Mr. Cecil Rhodes is employing 8,000 men, white and black, at Kimberley in road making, as a remedy for destitution.

The latest Liberal explanation of the sending of the Transvaal contingent is that "as a matter of tactics the Laurier Government has yielded so far to the Loyalty cry."

The vehicles for the British army corps, including six miles for the artillery, make a procession of twenty-one miles in length. And then there is the army corps itself requiring a little room.

It is announced that the queen will offer Lady Symons, widow of General Symons, the first vacant suite of rooms in Hampton Court, where, under similar circumstances, now live Lady Napier and other widows of British heroes.

It is understood that the Admiralty, on General Buller's advice, has arranged that cruisers from the Cape should go out to intercept all arriving transports, and inform them of the latest orders respecting their destination, which are to be kept secret.

According to a despatch from De-Aar the Boers at Kimberley have got the exact range of the mines and are constantly throwing shells at the dynamite huts. Several of the latter have been blown up, and the damage done to the mines already amounts to many thousand pounds.

None could ever describe the Boer flag of the South African Republic as a thing of beauty. It has a plain field of green running from top to bottom, and covering one-fourth of the flag. The rest is red, white and blue, in three stripes. Certainly not a very artistic ensign.

The Times, of Natal, editorially urges the Home Government not to be carried away by the spirit of magnanimity. In the eventual settlement of the war, it says, the rebels' farms and stock should provide the compensation due the loyalists for losses incurred through their loyalty in the shape of wrecked homes, burned stores, looted stock, the acts of rebel farmers.

A special from Queenstown, Cape Colony, dated November 8, says: The Boer commander and several burghers, unarmed, visited Burghersdorp yesterday. There is no sign of the Boers at Dordrecht. At a meeting of the Dutch residents of Aliwai North, yesterday protests were sent to Premier Schreiner against the abandonment of the town. The Dutch police there have deserted the Boers.

The South Africa war, besides making the public acquainted with such queer geographical names as Elands-laagte, Ramathlabama, Pitsani, Pothlugi, etc., has given us Kaffirgram as a new word for the enrichment of the general language. A Kaffirgram is a message brought by a Kaffir, and frequently suggests that the native African is well within the class in which King David included all men—liars.

In his speech on the colonial contingents, Lord Landsdowne said they were offered by the respective Governments, but the impetus came from the people. The Montreal Gazette remarks that possibly the Minister for War is aware how much impetus the

Laurier government needed before it gave way to the will of the people. They only yielded when it became a choice of following this impetus or being kicked out.

Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, Chancellor of Exchequer, speaking at Bristol said: "The war in South Africa has destroyed both conventions with the Transvaal. We must establish there a pure and honest government on the basis of equal rights, and on something more enduring than paper safeguards. Subject to this, we should give whatever self government may be possible in South Africa. No one desires that great country to be governed permanently from Downing street."

A militia general order gives the following as the establishment of the 2nd Battalion, Royal Canadian Regiment of Infantry: Lieutenant-colonel, 1; second in command, 1, major, 1; captains, 10; lieutenants, 24; adjutant, 1; quartermaster, 1; medical officers, 2; total officers, 41; regimental sergeant-major, 1; staff sergeants, 8, colour sergeants, 8; sergeants, 32; total sergeants of regiments and staff sergeants, 50; corporals, 40; drummers or buglers, 16; privates, 872; total rank and file, 912; total of all ranks, 1019; horses for officers, 7. Officers appointed or attached to, and non-commissioned officers and men enlisted in the second battalion, Royal Canadian Regiment, will, until further orders, be considered a part thereof, and will be returned on the demand of their respective corps.

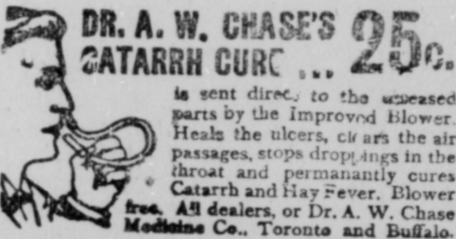
