The British Crisis.

The news to-day is that the Queen has asked the Marquis of Salisbury to form a Government, and that he has accepted the task.

The Treatment of "Mr. Riel."

In the House of Commons, a few days ago, Hon. Mr. Laurier (Mr. Blake's Lieutenant) drew the attention of the Government to the telegram from Regina, published in the papers, stating that Louis Riel when taking daily exercise, carries in his right hand the chain weight attached to his leg.

Two Inquests.

Verdicts of the Coroner's Jury in two cases were published yesterday. There were several points of similarity between the two. Both the persons killed were past the prime of life; both came to a violent and untimely death for which they were totally unprepared; and the object for which both were destroyed was "money."

But much more importance was attached to the first case than to the last. The investigation into the first was searching and thorough, extending over three weeks, while the last was disposed of in an hour.

But these are not sufficient reasons for apparent apathy of the Coroner's Jury. If the law of the land had not been deliberately violated, the fatal draught had not been drunk, and the woman would not have lost her life.

The "American Law Review," for June, contains a lengthy notice of "Haszard and Warburton's Reports of cases determined in the Supreme Court, the Court of Chancery and Vice-Admiralty Court of Prince Edward Island." Here is an extract:—

"Prince Edward Island is chiefly known to America as a summer resort. It has a charming summer climate and a most agreeable society. We believe that politically it is now a part of the Province of Nova Scotia, as is also its eastern neighbor, Cape Breton Island. One who has been there can hardly imagine what use the honest inhabitants of that country can have for the law and lawyers. But it seems that they do have their controversies, and we apprehend that when a substantial right is infringed, true to the instincts of their sturdy ancestry, they will spend more money in obtaining redress according to law than their American cousins will.

Late as it is in the session, Mr. Chapleau's Chinese Bill will be proceeded with this year.

WHAT AN INDIAN THINKS ABOUT IT.—LETTER OF THANKS TO SIR JOHN MACDONALD.

The following interesting letter was read in the House of Commons a few days ago:—

HAGERSVILLE, 30th May, 1885.

MY DEAR SIR JOHN,—I should have written to you some time ago to thank you for making the Indian a "person" in the Franchise Bill; other affairs, however, have prevented me from performing my duty.

I now thank you on the part of the Grand Council of Ontario, of which body I am secretary. At the meeting in September last the vice-president, Chief Solomon James, introduced the subject, having previously given me notice by the enclosed letter, which kindly return to me.

I now thank you on the part of the memory of my father and on the part of myself. For many years we advocated and urged this step as the one most likely to elevate the Aborigines to a position more approaching the independence of the whites.

I am, my dear Sir John, Your obedient servant, KAIKWAQONABY, Indian Chief.

The scene when the result was announced beggars description. I have not seen anything like it since the Bradlaugh debate. The counting of the votes took much longer than usual. The whole house was in a quiver of excitement when the tellers approached the Speaker.

The same scene was re-enacted in the lobby afterwards. The Tories literally jumped for joy. Mr. Parnell was smiling quietly above the groups, and the Irishmen were pale with excitement.
