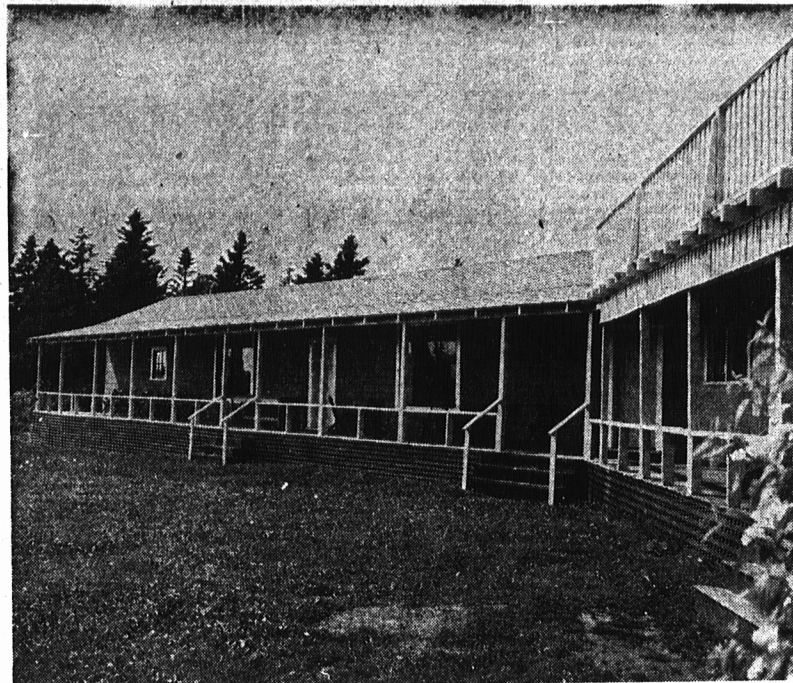

S'side Golf And Country Club Opens Today



The Summerside Golf and Country Club officially opens this afternoon. A beautiful new club house (shown above) in which is located a spacious lounge, has made possible the establishment at Summerside of Prince Edward Island's only country club.

The country Club is operated in conjunction with the Golf Club. For those who do not play golf, a social membership in the club gives every member all the advantages of a modern country club. For the playing members there is, in addition to the conveniences of a new club house replete with an excellent stock of golfing equipment for sale or rent, a picturesque, well kept, nine-hole golf course.

Two former citizens of China, yesterday at Summerside became citizens of Canada and received certificates of Canadian citizenship in a brief but impressive ceremony before Judge L. G. Lewis, at the regular sitting of the June term of the County Court. The two, Doo Yee "Jim" Leung, and Git Hing Wong, are proprietors of the "New World Cafe", on Water Street in Summerside, where they have resided for the past 15 years, and both men have been in Canada for over 35 years.

In a letter to each of the new citizens, H. E. Harris, minister of citizenship and immigration said, in part, "by this certificate of citizenship you have been granted the rights and privileges of a citizen of Canada. These rights and privileges entitle you to freedom of speech, religion, thought, and action, the right to vote as you choose, and the right to be secure in your possessions."

Your citizenship carries with it the obligation of defending your adopted country in time of need of living in peaceful brotherhood with your fellow Canadians, and of doing your part in the preservation of Canadian ideals and institutions.

Mr. T. L. Linkletter, Summerside barrister, spoke briefly and congratulated both gentlemen on receiving their Canadian citizenship. He stated that he had known both new citizens for 10 to 12 years and felt they would do nothing to bring dishonor to the citizenship that they had just received.

Located about two miles west of Summerside, amid beautiful close out greens of the golf course, and surrounded on two sides by sheltering groves of trees, the new club house is situated only a few hundred yards from the warm salt water and clean sandy beach of Bedeque Bay.

The building itself is a white trimmed, grey, ranch style building with green asphalt shingled roof. It is about 140 feet long and 20 feet wide, and has a covered veranda 8 feet wide extending 100 feet on the south side of the building.

It contains a main lounge, women's lounge and locker room, men's lounge and locker room, men's lounge and locker room, and a fully equipped kitchen, canteen, and living quarters for the caretaker.

In the main lounge, which is 75 x 20 feet, two large picture windows permit an excellent view over most of the course. Hardwood floors and walls of knotty pine; overhead and floor lamps; green floral drapes, leather covered furniture, card tables, ping-pong table, radio, and piano add to the delightful atmosphere of this large lounge.

In the ladies lounge room a cosy fireplace adds to the attractiveness of this fine club house. The kitchen contains, among other equipment, an electric stove and refrigerator, and the fine foods prepared there can be served directly to the main lounge which it adjoins.

210 Golf Members
Approximately 110 men and 100 women are golf playing members of the club, and club officials said yesterday that this was about all the playing members that could conveniently be arranged into the playing schedule of the club; however, a growing list of social members, and facilities to accommodate a great many more who are or will be interested in becoming social members of the Island's only country club already indicate success for the club.
