Record For Potato Shipments Predicted

Potato shipments from Prince Edward Island will probably reach record proportions this season with 7,580 cars shipped from the first of the crop season August First to date, declared Mr. C. T. Montgomery superintendent of the Canadian National Railways here. For the corresponding dates last season 6,894 cars were shipped and for the season 1947-48 the total amounted to 7,239. These potatoes he said were consigned to central and western Canada as well as to places throughout the United States.

Turnips are also reaching record proportions in the number shipped. Mr. Montgomery stated. To date 1,745 carloads have been shipped for the season 1949-50 against 1,067 for last season and 1,021 for the season 1947-48.
