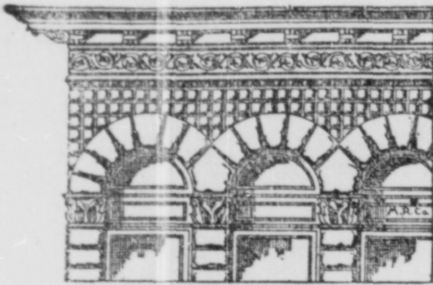

### "THE BOXERS."

"WHO ARE THESE BOXERS?"—is a question which many persons interested in the latest developments of the Eastern question are just now asking. This question is answered by a correspondent of the American Bible Society, resident at Tien Tsin, who has sent to his friends in New York an elaborate account of the matter. According to this correspondent, the Chinese name of this fanatical body of men is I Ho Ch'uan, of which the English translation is "Righteous Harmony Fists." It is a so-called secret society which made its first appearance about one year ago. It rapidly attracted multitudes of men, both young and old, who formed into small bands of gymnasts. Each band was conducted by a "demonized" leader, who, by the selection of an epileptic patient, or by the aid of hypnotism, caused a "medium" to display wild and strange speech, this serving as a basis for the claim of the society to spiritual power. Every follower was assured of immunity from death or physical injury, their bodies being spiritually protected from sword cuts and bullets. By the 1st of last July the "boxers" had added vast numbers to their ranks, and all are armed with broad swords and in some cases with fire-arms. They finally became so powerful and so much in evidence that the governor of Shantung sent a force to dispel them, which only excited them to more open and bitter hatred against Christians, especially the Catholics, toward whom, at first, their ill-will was particularly directed. They represented to ignorant multitudes that the sympathies of the Government were with them and adopted as a motto: "Exalt the dynasty and expiate the foreigners." This writer says: it is known that the former governor of Shantung had encouraged and aided the "Boxers" in their organization, and this apparently with the approval of the central government. The Peking government spoke of them as patriots, and they were believed to be formed as a sort of militia to prevent the encroachment of the Germans. Minister Conger, the United States representative at Peking, acted promptly upon all information received. But in spite of ready acquiescence and polite letters from the bureau of foreign affairs, nothing was really done to put down the rebellion, now properly so called, since it had passed beyond official control. Finally Mr. Brooks was captured by the "Boxers," mutilated and beheaded, and then the extreme gravity of the situation was revealed: the government could no longer govern, nor afford protection, nor stay the rebellion. The Boston Advertiser remarks that there is a popular impression, widely prevailing, that this rebellion had its origin in Peking, and nothing has tended to dissipate this impression. True, some "Boxers" have been killed, (the lack of spiritual protection being due to their "lack of faith," as their surviving friends are assured) but the spirit of defiance has not been diminished, and on every hand may be heard open threats that vast armies of "Boxers" will ere long march on to Tien Tsin.

—We learn that indignation meetings are threatened in the Second District of Queen's and the First of Prince. Fort Augustus, which has also been cheated out of its representative, ought also to protest against the political rascality that has triumphed.

### AN ILLUSTRATION.

The political situation in British Columbia today strikingly illustrates the importance of adhering strictly to the party system in the government of a free country. Premier Martin has been badly defeated at the polls; and, if the party system prevailed, he would, of course, resign at once, and be succeeded by a capable administration, backed up by the better elements of the Province. But, instead of two parties, there are six political groups in British Columbia, viz: "the Martinite," "Opposition," "Conservative," "Labour," "Provincial Party" and "the Independents." The result of the election is a general mix up of these groups, in the midst of which Martin will hold on to power and will perhaps, unscrupulous manipulator as he is, be enabled to maintain himself in office even after the meeting of the Legislature. A despatch to the Guardian announces that "it is very unlikely that the Opposition factions can combine and many believe that another appeal to the people will be necessary." So it is quite possible that the Province will be put to the trouble and expense of another election and that Martin may, after all, be enabled to override the will of a big majority of the people for a considerable period of time. All the doubt and uncertainty, upon which Martin will trade, and all the corruption that is likely to ensue, would be avoided if here had been one straight party in Opposition to the rasorial Martin. The Party system—badly as it works when operated by unprincipled men—is the better system; and the people will do well, if, adopting the recent wise suggestion of Lord Salisbury, they adhere to the party system and see that both parties are strong—strong in capable and honest men.

### AN OTTAWA FACT,

#### AN OTTAWA OPINION.

The Ottawa Citizen has been looking into the question of the Pineau letter: "An examination of the register of the Brunswick hotel reveals the fact that Mr. Pineau registered there on March 3. At the date of writing he had, therefore, had five days' experience with the government, and was qualified to speak by the book when he wrote: 'I have been well served by the government.'"

After reviewing the facts in connection with the Pineau episode, the Citizen says:

"This is a sad, dark chapter in Canadian politics, and suggests the extent to which corruption has permeated the once great Liberal party. It should make every lover of his country hug his head with shame. A Government that can consent to hold power by such treachery is utterly unworthy in moral sense and unworthy of public confidence. It is the knowledge of the fact that his administration has forfeited the respect of the majority of the electors of Prince Edward Island that makes Premier Farquharson hesitate to appeal to the people and end the disgraceful condition, and he is not willing to take any chances till Laurier shall have appealed to the country, and enjoyed the aid of Sir Louis and the corrupt gang of Liberals now running riot in that province to secure another term of office. But we warn the Minister of Marine and Fisheries that an incensed electorate will judge him by the company he keeps, and measure out to him a swift and condign punishment at the first moment they are permitted to mark their ballots."

**BODY FOUND.**—The body of Frank McCormick drowned near Governor's Island some weeks ago, was found this afternoon. It was brought to Charlottetown by Mr. Taylor, of St. Peter's Island.

—It is suggested that when the people fully appreciate the fact that the Provincial Provincial Act recently passed, is a humbug and fraud, worthy the unprincipled authors of the license law of last session, they will be none the less disposed to vote down those who deceived them about the plebiscite.

—The City Council have granted \$50 for the purchase of a cup to be given to the militia company whose members make the largest number of points at the athletic meet on Dominion Day. This splendid trophy will doubtless encourage the boys to win glory for themselves and their company by capturing it, as it will be by long odds the finest prize ever given at an athletic meet in this province.

—The Birmingham Post, organ of Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, the secretary of state for the colonies, says it bears from an official source at the Hague that a serious question concerning President Kruger is now before the Netherlands ministry. The paper adds that the President up to last Friday had decided to seek refuge on board the Dutch cruiser Frisland now off Lorenzo Marques, and asserts: "There is beyond doubt, good reason to believe that instructions there sent have been cabled to the commander of the warship."
