### Work Slows As New Year's Spirit Takes Over In Russia

MOSCOW (AP)—The spirit of the New Year took over the Soviet Union Sunday night. Workday life slowed almost to a standstill.  
Kremlin leaders—if they follow post-revolutionary tradition—will lose aside their political cares to join Monday and Tuesday in the Russians' gayest holiday.  
The Soviet press drummed out the old year with claims of successes for world Communism in 1956 and warnings that "reactionary imperialists" will try for a comeback in 1957.  
Communist and government bosses, who combined many features of the Christian Christmas observance with the Soviets' new year, expected to see the drawn of 1957 within the Kremlin.  
Premier Nikolai Bulganin is host to the New Year's party here and those admitted in the past say it is the happiest event of the entire year in old St. George's Hall.  
All of Russia celebrates New Year's with a Christmas flavor which includes "New Year's Trees." Sometimes the older Russians forget and call them Christmas trees. There are exchanges of gifts and drinking parties which at times reach the stage of grand banquets.  
The Soviet government decreed this Sunday a regular working day giving the people Monday and Tuesday to celebrate—and recover.

### Postpone Plans To Build Two New Penitentiaries

OTTAWA (CP)—Plans to build two new federal penitentiaries have been postponed pending a federal-provincial meeting next week which could bring about sweeping changes in Canada's penal system.  
The meeting of Justice Minister Garson and provincial attorneys general will discuss the broad recommendations made last summer by a four-man committee headed by Mr. Justice Gerald Fauteux of the Supreme Court of Canada. No date has been set.  
One of the committee's major proposals was that the federal government take responsibility for keeping prisoners sentenced to terms of more than six months, instead of two years as at present. It also recommended establishment of a five-man national parole board and creation of special institutions to care for certain types of prisoners.  
THREE PLANNED  
The committee's report was the product of 2½ years' work. About a year before it was published, the federal government announced plans to build three new penitentiaries.  
Preliminary construction on one of these has started at Joyceville, Ont., about 15 miles northeast of the present Kingston penitentiary.  
But no definite steps have been taken to start the other two. One was to be a women's penitentiary at Kingston, the other a new penitentiary for men in one of the Prairie provinces.  
The fact that the federal-provincial meeting will not be held until spring indicates that the major portions at least, of the Fauteux committee report will not be implemented at the next session of Parliament.

### Report USSR Grants Loan To Hungary

BUDAPEST (AP)—Premier Janos Kadar's Communist government announced Sunday that Russia has granted Hungary a \$50,000,000 loan to help rebuild its revolution-shattered economy.  
Kadar's Communist party newspaper said much more money and material aid would be needed and added:  
"It is expected that Western countries also will contribute substantial loans to alleviate our economic difficulties."  
The party newspaper Nepszabadsag has been pleading for several days for technical assistance and loans from the West as well as Eastern countries.  
Some Hungarian economic experts say Hungary will need \$400,000,000 in hard currency to get back on its feet. The government is reported aware that it can get the total necessary aid only through Western contributions.  
Russia, which was responsible for most of the material damage here through the Red army's attack on the revolutionaries, announced its aid first, but disclosed terms of the Soviet loan.

"The sea wall around Victoria Park was repaired at considerable expense and should hold for a great many years, with little cost for maintenance."  
Land, decided to the City for new streets in the Northwest part of our City, was accepted, resulting in the laying of water and sewer mains, and the grading and surfacing of these new streets.  
Worthy of note here is that his is the only area now left in our City to be developed.  
The year 1956 saw the establishment of a Metropolitan Commission, composed of representatives from the Board of Trade, the Villages of Parkdale and Spring Park, and the City of Charlottetown, to study the feasibility of the amalgamation of these two villages with our City.  
A survey in this connection is being conducted by Mr. W.H. Crandall, Consulting Engineer, of Moncton, and on completion of this, his findings will be studied by the Metropolitan Commission and, if satisfactory, will be presented to our Legislature for further action by them.  
The year 1956 saw our Mayor President of the Federation of Mayors and Municipalities for Canada. This, I believe, was a high honour to our Province and City. This body represents the largest group of taxpayers in Canada.

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### Gives Target Date For Suez Canal Opening

CAIRO (AP) — Lt.-Gen. Raymond A. Wheeler estimated Sunday the Suez Canal will be open in May for the largest type vessels adapted to its depth. Un salvage work is to start on the northern end Monday.  
The U.S. expert in charge of the canal clearance for the United Nations said that under present plans a passage for ships of 2-foot draft should be completed early in March. That would cover oil tankers and other craft of roughly 10,000 tons.  
The normal depth is 34 feet, three inches, which will accommodate all but the largest of ocean-going vessels. Both sunken ships and silt are hazards now. Dredging operations halted with the outset of the Israeli and British-French attacks on Egypt two months ago.  
In a statement issued by the UN Information office here, Wheeler first announced clearance operations at the northern end of the canal would be initiated Sunday "at full speed in co-operation with Egyptian authorities."  
He amended this in a talk later with correspondents at Port Said, saying the UN salvage fleet would get to work there at 8 a.m. Monday. Other vessels started clearance of the southern end at Suez Saturday.
