## THE OUTLOOK FOR CONSERVATIVES

### Is Encouraging Throughout Canada.

#### ELECTIONS WILL BE HELD IN THE MIDDLE OF OCTOBER.

Charles H. Cahon Will Contest the Cumberland County

HALIFAX, Aug. 25.—The Liberal-Conservatives of Cumberland County have unanimously nominated Mr. Charles H. Cahon as a candidate to contest that seat in the Dominion Parliament.

The nomination was made by a most enthusiastic convention.

Sir Charles Tupper, who is looking the picture of health, made a grand speech.

Sir Charles says he believes the elections will take place the middle of October, and that the outlook all over the country is most hopeful for the Liberal-Conservative party.

#### LETTER FROM MR. FULLERTON

### Two Fearful Disasters—Islanders Reported Well.

By the courtesy of Mr. T. G. James we are permitted to make the following extracts from a letter received by him from Rev. Mr. Fullerton:

SPRINGS, S. A., July 16, 1900.

Since I last wrote we have had two of these fearful disasters which have been so frequent in this campaign. At a place called Watervaal, a few miles north of Pretoria, two companies of the Lincolns were cut to pieces and three other companies with a squadron of the famous Scotch Greys were taken prisoners. West of Johannesburg, on the Potchefstrooms railway, the gay Gordons were marching along evidently with a sense of great security, as they had, from all we can learn, no advance guard thrown out, when a body of wily Boers pounced upon them suddenly and attempted to capture a gun. The Gordons worsted them out at a cost of forty casualties. The Boers are putting up a fierce fight, their force being composed largely of rebels from Cape Colony and Transvaal. The British authorities are at last beginning to deal sharply with them, e. g. whenever a Boer who has laid down arms, taken the oath, and returned to his home, is found to be in the commando his house is at once burned to the ground. We have been too lenient.

As I said, I am the only Chaplain with the Canadians now and conduct the Protestant services. Yesterday morning I had a very fine gathering of Canadians, Artillery and Mounted Infantry the singing was good and everything was, I trust, conducive to the good of the men.

I do hope and pray that the church is doing well. I am satisfied that by the time you received this we shall be on our return trip. Today Hutton is engaging the enemy 12 miles off (we can hear the booming of the naval guns) while Roberts is moving north Pretoria with a strong force determined, I believe, to crush the dishonest, cowardly and tyrannical Boers. The style of fighting has changed. They hide behind stones until they have just time to fire, jump on their horses and clear out. They never reveal their whereabouts.

We were informed last night in regimental order that Ernie Lord had been sent to England last month. It was a wise step, as he was quite sick, as also Walker, who was dealt with in the same way.

Out of the Island 60 we have only 14 men left with us. Springs has been rendered important, because it now forms the base of supplies for some divisions, hence our outposts are called upon to be very vigilant, so as to prevent another raid.

Thirty Boers were seen near on Saturday, but when our mounted men went out they were nowhere to be seen.

The Islanders here are very well indeed; so also are McDonald and Weeks. Remember me to all friends. With kind regards,

## CHINESE DEFEATED AT TIEN TSIN

### The Chinese Lost 8000 Troops

#### IN THE ATTACK ON THE LEGATIONS,

British Casualties Reported as Very Small.

LONDON, Aug. 25.—Four hundred Americans defeated a body of Chinese at Tien Tsin. The Chinese admit losing 8,000 troops in the attacks at Pekin on the Legations.

A despatch says the Emperor Kwang Su has been captured by the Japanese. Gen. Gaselee reports the British casualties as being very small.
