Local and Other Items

WE are informed, and are authorized to state, that the Charlottetown Board of Trade had nothing whatever to do with obtaining a "subsidy to the charterers of certain tramp steamers which were loaded with oats in Charlottetown this spring," as insinuated by our correspondent "Shipper."

The arrangement seems to have been made by the Government and the "charterers," whoever they may have been.

The shippers of these oats, we presume, had the grain on hand; and, finding no market in the Provinces—owing as we contend to large importations of corn, resulting from the abolition of the corn duty—while prices ruled low in England, they turned to the Government; and, having influence at Ottawa, they obtained the subsidy for their chartered steamer.

The transaction shows ingenuity and resourcefulness on the part of the buyers and shippers of these oats. But it was grossly unfair to other shippers and owners of shipping here. We don't blame the charterers who obtained the subsidy. Merchants are to be justified in doing what they can to save themselves from loss, so long as it can be done honorably. But what about the government which allowed a large amount of public money to be used for the relief of certain merchants and charterers while other merchants and ship owners in the community got no subsidy and suffered loss? What will those who have oats on hand and obtained no subsidy do? And what will those unsubsidized ship owners and shippers who make a business of carrying oats between here and England do?

It will readily be seen that a subsidy to steamship owners or charterers, who provide steamers fitted with cold storage and ventilating appliances and bring ships here for the purpose of opening a new and lucrative trade direct between this Province and Great Britain in respect to fruit, butter, cheese, poultry, meats, eggs, etc., is a different thing to a subsidy to the charterers of an ocean tramp which calls here, once for all, to load oats! We should commend the government that provided the subsidy in the first case; we have to condemn the government which has provided the subsidy in the last case. Of course to Board of Trade of Charlottetown could have nothing to do with the latter transaction. The Board of Trade exists for the public good; but this transaction was for the good of a few favored individuals.

SCHOOL BOARD.—The regular monthly meeting of the school board was held last night. The resignation of Miss Louise Barrett as teacher in West Kent was accepted. Miss Maud Bremner has been appointed to the vacancy. Mr. N. Campbell will be retained as teacher in West Kent, pending the return of Mr. Bowness from South Africa.

THE CAMPANA.—The Campana called at this port yesterday afternoon on return to Montreal. She left again shortly after 9 p. m. with a large cargo consisting in part of 1900 boxes cheese shipped by Carvell Brothers, 1200 boxes cheese shipped by A. J. Biffin and 2000 boxes eggs shipped by Sundry persons. The Campana's passenger list this trip numbers 120 persons mostly taking the round trip.

DANCE AT THE CLIFF.—At the Cliff House, Stanhope, the guests last night participated in a masquerade ball arranged by the genial host and hostess. The costumes were very pretty, and in some cases unique. The proceedings which began by a grand march to the ballroom continued throughout the evening to the great enjoyment of the guests. A refreshing supper was served and the music was exceptionally good.

SHOULD BE STOPPED.—The practice now indulged in by many boys and men of bathing in public places is growing to such extent that something should be done to stop it. Last evening a man undressed himself at the foot of Richmond Street, West, in the presence of a crowd of children of both sexes. He was apparently drunk, and had to be dressed and taken away by one of the residents of the neighborhood. An occasional visit on the part of the police would do a great deal to prevent such scenes.

THE BOAT RACE.—Tomorrow morning's race promises to be one of the most keenly contested yet.
