Visual Education Is Theme At Convention's Final Day

SOURIS — Speaking on visual aids, Stan MacLennan, director of visual education, gave an interesting lecture and demonstration on the visual method of teaching at the second day's sessions of the teachers' fall-convention being held here yesterday.

Mr. MacLennan spoke on the different types of visual aids which might be used in a classroom, and said that after tests had been made it was found that children taught by visual aid often made better marks than those taught by ordinary ways including homework. He also stated that teachers may obtain film strips from the Film Board free of cost for use in the schools.

GIVES REPORT
Miss Mabel Matheson, president of the P. E. I. T.F. gave a report on Federation affairs

and indicated various ways in which a teacher could help to improve the organization. She also spoke about the value of the workshop, and its benefit to the teachers' work in the classroom. Miss Matheson also stated that it was proposed to hold a provincial conference on education on or about November 9th, but that plans for such a possible conference were not finalized.

Miller MacFadyen, supervisor of correspondence, spoke on family allowances during the afternoon session, and in the course of his remarks explained that pupils now have to attend 85 per cent of the number of days instead of 75 per cent as formerly. After a short discussion on when and where future workshops should take place, the meeting closed.

Geo. MacDonald Dies In Ch'town

MONTAGUE — The death of George W. MacDonald 68, of Montague occurred at the P. E. I. Hospital on Friday.

The late Mr. MacDonald was a highly esteemed resident of Montague for many years when he operated the Central Garage, and in later years a machine shop. He also took an active part in community affairs. He was a veteran of World War I a member of the Canadian Legion and a past Master of St. Andrew's Lodge No. 13.
