**HEARTY RECEPTION AT CHARLOTTETOWN**  
**In Honor of McCarthy, of Souris,**  
**RETURNED FROM SERVICE**

On the Veldts and in the Fastnesses of South Africa  
The reception given Private McCarthy upon his arrival in Charlottetown last night was highly creditable considering the short time in which the preparations were made. But it was nothing compared to the reception the entire Island contingent will get when they return, as it is hoped they will, during the next two or three months.  
It was after six o'clock before it was definitely known that Wayne and McCarthy were on their way home. Then orders were issued for the militia to muster on Mark et Square at 9.45 to meet the train, and the order was generally obeyed. The two Artillery Companies, the Engineers, the 82nd Battalion with the Band of the Fourth Regiment, turned out, and at ten o'clock marched to the railway station, the band playing "Home Sweet Home," the "Red White and Blue," and other airs.  
At the station they formed up in open order to await the arrival of their companions-in-arms who had been fighting the battles of the Empire in South Africa. The attendance of citizens was exceedingly large, numbering several thousands. The station was crowded and the streets in the vicinity thronged with people eager to get a glimpse of the returning soldier.  
As the train came into the station its

approach was signalized by the cracking of torpedoes placed upon the rails. Upon its entering the station the great crowd surged to and fro, and in the excitement the hats and bonnets of the ladies must have suffered severely.  
As Private McCarthy came off the train he was grasped by one of the sailors from the Tribune, who hugged and kissed him several times. Then Miss Annie Mellish, whose brother is on active service in South Africa, presented Private McCarthy with a bouquet and gave him a hearty welcome to Charlottetown.  
After coming out of the station McCarthy passed through the lines of militia before entering the carriage in waiting, and was repeatedly cheered as he went by. In the carriage, besides the returning soldier, were His Worship Mayor Warburton and Col. Moore, representing respectively the citizens and militia.  
The militia then left the station and proceeded to the Market Square, going by way of Water, Great George, Richmond and Market Streets. The band played appropriate airs during the march, and the great crowds of people on the streets cheered lustily.  
At the Square the procession halted, and from the carriage addresses were made by Mayor Warburton, Col. Moore and Jas. Mulligan, an officer of the Tribune. Mayor Warburton spoke for the citizens, Col. Moore for the militia and Mr. Mulligan for the navy. All extended a hearty welcome to the returned soldier. Cheers were given for the Mayor, Col. Moore, McCarthy and Wayne and the Navy, and the band played patriotic airs, closing with the National Anthem.  
It was after eleven o'clock before the crowd dispersed and McCarthy was taken to the Hotel Davies. Private McCarthy will remain in town until tomorrow when he will go east.
