Premier Accuses Opposition Of 'Auction Block' Tactics

Premier Shaw, speaking at New London last night in a Progressive Conservative rally in his own First Queens district, accused the Liberal party of "auction block" tactics. He said that his government makes an announcement of policy, the Liberals try to go one better, as for example in the hospital insurance field.

The Premier said that as of Dec. 1, hospital insurance premiums in this province are fixed. The cost hereafter will be paid out of general revenue.

Mr. Shaw gave a review of the government's program and dealt with accomplishments since he took office. He said his government had paved 400 miles of roads in three and a half years, compared with about 200 miles by the Liberals in 24 years in office.
