The Brigadier, for the past few years was Executive Staff Officer of the Canadian Forces Medical Council, Department of National Defence took over his present duties on March 15. Well known in the medical profession, he was born in Winnipeg in 1906 and graduated in medicine from the University of Manitoba in 1930, he is a specialist in paediatrics.

His military career began in 1933 as a lieutenant in the R. C. A. M. C. He was promoted to captain in 1935. At the outbreak of World War II he was posted to Jamaica, B. W. I. as R. M. O. of the Win-nipeg Grenadiers and in 1941 he was promoted to major and trans-ferred to Hong Kong.

A WAR PRISONER Along with our other Canadian troops he was taken prisoner in December 1941 and only released in August 1945. During his years of captivity he maintained meticu-lous records of his fellow Cana-dians, which have been of im-mense value in the studies of the effects of malnutrition.

On his return to Canada Dr. Crawford was promoted to Lieut. Col. and appointed O. C. of med-icine at Fort Osborne Hospital, in the following year he was ap-pointed Director of Medical Research, Army Headquarters, Ottawa. In 1948 he was appointed Senior Con-sultant (Professional and Scientific Adviser) to the D. G. M. S. with the rank of colonel. Brig. Craw-ford became Deputy Director Gen-eral of Medical Services in 1952 and the following year came the ap-pointment of Executive Staff Of-ficer, C. F. M. C. with the rank of Brigadier.

A writer of extensive articles for our medical journals, his most out-standing contribution was on the long term follow-up of repatriates from Japanese P. O. W. camps.

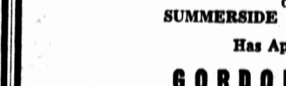

First Eye Bank Now In Operation

TORONTO (CP) — Canada's first eye bank, to provide new cor-neas for persons with defective sight, has been operating exper-imentally in Ontario for seven months, the Canadian National In-stitute for the Blind said Thursday.

The CMB said all hospitals in the province with more than 130 beds have been provided with spe-cial containers for the eyes and a routing service has been set up to supply surgeons who need eyes for corneal transplants.

The institute said it did not re-lease news of the project until it was definitely known that a need for an eye bank existed.

Because of increased interest in corneal transplants, such a need does exist in Canada, said the in-stitute.
