OGILVIE'S REPORT BROUGHT DOWN Not Much Information in it.

OGILVIE ONLY TRIED CASES SINCE AUGUST LAST

Only Three Cases Were Enquired Into by Him.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, May 31.—Mr. Ogilvie's report on the Yukon investigation has been presented. It is a long document and sets forth that the commissioner decided at the beginning to hear no evidence relating to events subsequent to last August.

When this decision was announced the miners committee and the proprietors of the Nugget newspaper withdrew from the country and refused to prosecute.

Mr. Ogilvie therefore investigated only three cases. One of those relates to the claims said to have been improperly given to the woman whose case was discussed in the debate on the address. Mr. Ogilvie finds that the claim should not have been allowed but says that Fawcett allowed it under a mistake as to the facts.

The other cases in which it was alleged that government officers compelled the miners to take them into partnership, Ogilvie thinks were not proved.

QUEEN VICTORIA

To Undergo an Operation for Cataract.

LONDON, May 31.—Truth says that Queen Victoria has decided to undergo an operation for cataract when Professor Herman Padrnstelber, director of the Ophthalmic Hospital at Wiesbaden thinks the proper time has arrived.

The operation will be performed, according to Truth, at Osborne or Balmoral, probably after the parliamentary session.

PLAGUE MAY DELAY DEWEY

WEST INDIANS MAKE A MOVE For Direct Trade With Canada

FORCED TO DO THIS BY THE UNITED STATES

Which has Taken a Menacing Stand Regarding Tariff.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

KINGSTON, Jamaica, May 31.—There can be no doubt that the menacing position taken by the United States Government with regard to tariff relations between that country and the West India Islands is compelling these islands to look to Canada for relief from our embarrassing commercial situations. The first practical step in that direction was taken by Jamaica today when the legislature of the Colony voted an appropriation for the establishment of a West Indian trade agency at Ottawa. The Government also announced that negotiations would be opened with the Canadian Government for the establishment of a direct fast steamship line between Halifax and Jamaica.

The Legislature it is assured will vote a substantial subsidy.

AUSTRALIA VS. OXFORD.
