Dodgers Edge Yankees 2-1 in Series 4 Games

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Underdog Los Angeles Dodgers humbled the proud New York Yankees in four straight games, winning the fourth Sunday 2-1 on Sandy Koufax's mighty homer and a glaring Yankee error. Adding to the Yankees' humiliation the way the Dodgers won the finale. Joe Peptide failed to catch a fly ball and threw from third base after Boyer made a leaping stab of Jim Gilliam's hard smash in the seventh. Gilliam scooted all the way to third as the ball careered into right field foot territory. He scored the run that earned each Dodger nearly \$15,000 on Willie Davis' sacrifice fly to deep right center. Home runs by Frank Howard, a 450-foot blast into the second deck in left field in the fifth, and a matching 400-foot home run by Mickey Mantle of the Yanks in the seventh had been the only scores in a tight duel between lefties Koufax and Whitey Ford. Bobby Richardson opened the sixth with a single, the sixth hit of Koufax, but Sandy blew a third called strike past Tom Tresh and Mickey Mantle. Called back for another out, they finally closed it out when Willie threw out Hector Lopez, who tried to check his swing and hit the ball accidentally. The Yankees were out when Koufax was overtaken by the joyous Dodgers near the third base line. They swung his hands, pounded him on the back and one exuberant Dodger who looked like the Yankee Moose Skowron left his feet in a belly-flop.

Boyer leaped into the air and made a beautiful stop. When he came down, he fired in first with plenty of time for the out. Amazingly the ball got past Peptide, the Yankee first baseman, and rolled all the way to the stands while Gilliam footed around the bases. When Peptide came up with the ball, Gilliam was wearing third base. FLYES TO CENTRE Willie Davis followed with a high fly ball to Mantle in centre. Mickey had a chance to get the man but he uncorked a tremendous throw that took one hop and sailed into the mitt of Elston Howard — after Gilliam had crossed with the winning run. In the Yankee clubhouse, Peptide said he lost Boyer's throw in the sun and that he had a white hit in the lower stands. "First it hit my wrist, then my forearm, then my chest," he said in a low voice. "All I could see was white." It was the Dodgers' third victory in 11 World Series and the first since 1919. They beat Chicago White Sox in 1959. TIES BABE'S MARK Mantle's homer enabled him to tie Babe Ruth's record of 15 Series home runs. The Babe did it in 10 Series. Mickey equalled it in 11. Elston Howard topped the list with 15 at bats, including two off Koufax Sunday.
