THE VICTORIAS VICTORIOUS.

They Win From the St. Johns by Three Points.

The match game of hockey between the picked team from St. John and the Victorias of Charlottetown, took place last evening in Hillsborough Park, and resulted in a handsome win for the home players. The game was witnessed by a fairly large number of people, and the good play on both sides was generously applauded.

Both teams played six men. Through some misunderstanding, Sancton, who was to play with the visitors, failed to make connections, and the Victorias retired Leigh to even up.

It was about twenty minutes after 8 o'clock when the referee's whistle blew and the game began. Just after the "face off" the Victorias got possession of the puck and rushed it in the direction of the St. Johns goal, and after about five minutes play, mostly in their opponents territory, they shot the first goal. A few minutes later the visitors scored, and then the Victorias quickly added two more to their string. The visitors then scored twice in succession. Another goal was then shot by the home team, but it was not allowed. Just before half time, however, the Victorias scored again, making them four to the visitors three.

After play was resumed the Victorias shot three goals in rapid succession, and about ten minutes later they contributed two more—making them nine to the St. Johns three. The St. Johns then began to score, and before the half was over they made three goals. The score at the finish was, therefore, nine to six in favor of the Victorias.

The goals were made as follows: St. Johns—Mumford 3; Dunbrack 3. Victorias—H. Brehaut 4; Wallie Pickard 2; W Brehaut 1, H. Sprague 2. Mumford, of the St. Johns, is a member of the Amherst team. He took the place of one of the St. Johns men who could not come with the team, and made half the points scored by his side.

The game throughout was well played, even if it was a trifle one-sided in the early stages of the second half. The visitors put up a good game and tried hard to win. But they went up against one of the strongest teams the Victorias ever put on the ice and they were defeated.

Tonight the St. Johns and the Abegweits cross sticks, and the game promises to be even more interesting than that of last evening. As there will probably be a large attendance of spectators and the game will start on time it is advisable that all should be in their places early.

Mr. L. B. McMillan acted as referee last evening, and Messrs. W. McLeod and B. C. Prowse were the umpires.
