DROWNED.

THE BODY OF AN UNKNOWN MAN FOUND IN THE HILLSBOROUGH.

SHORTLY after two o'clock the passengers on board the steamer "Elfin" were attracted by a strange object floating in the river near the Prince Street Ferry Wharf.

The body is of a man apparently sixty years of age. His face is totally disfigured and the trunk is swollen very large. The legs are much bowed. The third and fourth fingers of the left hand are cut off above the second joint, and the second finger is bent to one side as though it had in time been severely crushed.

Last Sabbath, the Rev. George Steel baptized two adults, and afterwards admitted five persons into full membership with the Methodist Church at Brackley Point Road. The church was crowded.

The Methodists of Stanhope and Covehead are building a new church on Duncan McLachlan's farm. The old building was too dilapidated to repair, hence the new house. Already the building is rough-boarded and the roof shingled.

The Fredericton Affair.

FREDERICTON, AUGUST 1.—The excitement which prevailed throughout the town yesterday, has now quite subsided. All efforts to find Virtue have proved useless. Search is being made this morning across the river, as it was reported that a man answering his description was seen in a small boat with two other men, going over, public opinion here bears out the course adopted by the policemen yesterday, and if any of the shots fired by the police had taken fatal effect, there is no doubt but the community would back up the man by whose hand it was done.

Sergeant Vandine's physicians, Doctors Albertson and Coburn, say he passed a satisfactory night last night. If nothing occurs he probably will have a speedy recovery although it will be a long time before he will use his arm again.—St. John News.

French Notes.

The Post's Berlin correspondent telegraphs that the vote in the French chamber of deputies yesterday rejecting the bill granting Egyptian credits, is viewed by Germany with satisfaction, as indicating a French policy of peace and non-intervention.

Governments do not last long in France. That country has had no less than fifteen premiers since it became a republic about a decade ago.

Gambetta's journals recommend Grey to entrust the formation of a new Cabinet to M. Brisson, who succeeded Gambetta as President of the Chamber of Deputies.

There was a disgraceful scene on a recent Sunday at the Madeleine in Paris. One of the church officials found it necessary to expel a troop of British excursionists of the "Army" pattern, who were misbehaving themselves grossly during high mass, and exciting disgust among the worshippers.

The total number of journals published in France is 3,272, being 1,343 in Paris and 1,929 in the provinces. Of the former it is surprising to find that the most numerous class is financial (209), then medical (97) illustrated (88), fashions (81), political (71) law (64), Catholic (64) science (41), literature (30), and art (19). The provincial papers are thus classified according to their politics; Republican (615), Legitimist (177) Oranist (146), religious (108), Bonapartist (600).

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Wolsley on the War-Path.

Obstinacy of the Porte.

Russia Arming.

LONDON, Aug. 3.

Sir Garnet Wolsley has recovered from his severe attack of sickness and sailed for Egypt to-day.

Lord Duff-rin has sent another note to the Sultan, demanding a rebel, and threatens that the Turkish troops will not be allowed to land unless this is done. The Sultan still insists that England has no right to demand this, and will not issue the proclamation until the Turkish troops are in Egypt.

Russia, having been foiled in her attempt to take a leading part in the Egyptian negotiations, is now said to be aiming in order to make England join an European conference on Egyptian affairs. Serious complications are expected from this late European movement.

The calling out of the Reserves resulted in ten thousand Britons joining the colours.

"The John Bull's Run!"

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 3.

Six men and the corporal of the 60th Rifles were attacked by a party of Egyptians. The British soldiers fired one volley, then threw down their arms and fled. The run-aways have been placed under arrest.

Congress versus President!

The River and Harbor Bill passed by both Houses and vetoed by the President, has now been passed by the Congress, over the President's veto.

OTTAWA, Aug. 3.

Hon. Frank Smith, of Toronto, was sworn member of the Dominion Cabinet, to-day.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

LONDON, Aug. 1.

The Daily News Constantinople despatch says that the admiralty is preparing transports. Four have already started for Egypt. The Turkish troops will act conjointly with the English.

The News' Marseilles' despatch reports that the French Government ordered the infantry and marine brigade preparing to start for Egypt to be disbanded and the transports to be withdrawn.

All newspaper correspondents are under the provisions of the mutiny act in Egypt and are required to have licenses from the Duke of Cambridge, and are not allowed to go to the outposts without permission. Cipher dispatches are forbidden. The staff officer supervising telegrams may stop or alter them.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 1.

The Italian Government refuses to surrender to a British Court Martial an Italian employed in the Egyptian police, who is charged with leading a band of Greeks and natives, engaged in sacking the town.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 1.

Fears in regard to the water supply have subsided.

The number of Christians murdered at Damarhour, Tantah and Mahalla is now estimated at 550.

The Khedive, last evening, despatched a native emissary to the camp of Arabi Pasha for the purpose of procuring the release of Midshipman Dechar, of the British navy, who went on Saturday with a message to Ramleh and was taken prisoner. The emissary has not yet returned.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 1.

The Greek troops have occupied the Turkish village of Zartina, near the frontier. The Porte has demanded an explanation of the Greek representative.

The Conference will meet on Wednesday or Thursday to receive M. Gnos's communication explaining Russia's motives in abstaining from the deliberations of the Conference.

The Turkish fleet is not going to Egypt.

RAMLEH, Aug. 1.

A reconnaissance was made on Aboukir road, to-day.

It is reported that Arabi Pasha's vedettes are in close proximity to the works. The display of white flags is a mere farce. The rebels are strengthening their lines near Lake Mareotis. Scouts report seeing Arabi Pasha in camp with several European prisoners.

At eight o'clock p. m., guns on our right have just opened fire.
