Navigation In The Arctic Not Easy

ON BOARD HMCS LABRADOR — In the course of her current operations in the eastern Arctic, HMCS Labrador was beset in heavy pack ice, 15 to 20 feet thick and under considerable pressure. Difficulty was in the desired direction of the ship in full power available. It was decided to try easing the pressure ahead by using explosives to open a crack from the ship's position to a pool of open water some 500 yards on the starboard bow. There was little optimism on board that this method would succeed as explosives in ice-breaking have been singularly unsuccessful, especially when the ice is under any pressure. However, something had to be tried or the Labrador would stay where she was until a turn in the tide and wind eased the pressure by natural causes.
The ship's underwater diving team, under the charge of Lt. Cdr. John C. Ruse, of Grimsby, Ont., collected gear, explosives and other equipment and got out on the ice to reconnoitre the situation. A "testing charge" of 40 pounds was decided upon, to be detonated under the ice close to the open pool. The result of this was a reasonably spectacular bang, a shower of ice and very little else. Knowing amirks were exchanged by the "Goofers" crowding the Labrador's side to watch the operation.
The UDT crew, realizing that more drastic measures were required, next prepared a charge of 100 pounds and managed to get it down under the ice considerably deeper than the first one. The ensuing explosion was disappointing but was extremely satisfactory. A crack appeared from the pool and began to open towards the ship. Six engines were brought to the ready, the divers were re-embarked and the Labrador was under way again.

Subsidization Of Arts Seen "Essential"

CALGARY, (CP)—Government subsidization of the arts in Canada is essential if the arts are to develop as they should, Lady Eaton said in an interview here Friday.
Lady Eaton, widow of Sir John Eaton and mother of David Eaton, present head of the T. Eaton Co., criticized the government's laxity in coming to the assistance of groups attempting to provide Canada with a cultural life.
"What have they done about putting the recommendations of the Massey report into effect?" she asked. "As far as anyone can tell, they have probably pigeon-holed the report."
Lady Eaton said that if as many groups and individuals as possible would petition the government to take action in supporting the arts, "we might get somewhere."
"The government has done so much for the people through such things as the baby bonus and old age pensions and yet they have ignored the cultural aspect of life entirely," she said. "I believe they have educated people to think any support of the arts is a pure waste of money."
Lady Eaton was here during a western visit on which she will open a new store at Lethbridge.

Comment On Negro Trial In Mississippi

PARIS, (Reuters) — The Independent French newspaper Le Monde says the acquittal of two white men for killing a Negro boy in Mississippi proved that two scales of justice exist in the United States for whites and Negroes.
"Unhappily" it says, "what is wrong in the southern states is that the benefit of the doubt is often granted when the accused is a white man, but not when he is a Negro."
The paper comments that the trial "proves, if indeed proof were necessary that racial feeling is not dead in the United States in spite of the courage of an administration and Supreme Court bent on the disappearance of segregation which is contrary to the spirit of liberty and equality of which the American nation boasts."

Suggest Indian Reservation Probe
FORT FRANCES, Ont., (CP)—An investigation of the living and sanitary condition of 102 Indian families in the Red Lake area of northwestern Ontario was urged Friday by the Northwestern Ontario Associated Chambers of Commerce.
The action was urged in a resolution passed following a brief from the Red Lake Chamber of Commerce which described the Indians' living conditions. Their children are not attending school.
The brief said the Indians are living in abandoned prospector's shacks and lakeshore tents. For this reason they do not pay taxes and under present regulations there is no way to force school attendance.
The convention also recommended that the Ontario government construct road extensions southeast of the Lakehead to provide access to the southeastern part of Quebec Park.
