Lengthy argument over the operation of the newly constructed wading pool in Victoria Park took up most of the time at the regular monthly meeting of the City Council last evening.

Dr. Wendall MacDonald, City Health Officer, said he was doubtful of the health situation when numbers of children were using the pool and the water was only to be changed twice a week. When assured that the water would be changed every day and also tested daily for bacteria count he stated he felt that should be satisfactory. However, the biggest drawback to opening the pool appeared to be the matter of supervision. Mr. Cameron, president of the Kiwanis Club which built the pool, said plans were under way to have the Red Cross supervise its operation. Mrs. Harry Cudmore and Rev. M. D. Dunbar both said the Red Cross was willing to undertake the work, but they asked that a fence be built around the pool to permit better control of the children.

Moncton, N. B., June 9. An early morning trip, in both directions, between Borden, P. E. I., and Cape Tormentine, N. WOOD WILL MOVE TO SUMMERSIDE

The Most Reverend Walter Foster Barfoot, M.A., D.D., Archbishop of Edmonton and Primate of all Canada, met the Administrator, Mr. Justice Mark R. McGuigan, Premier A. W. Matheson, the members of the Government, Mayor J. D. Stewart of Charlottetown and Mayor Henry W. Wedge of Summerside, at an informal gathering in the Confederation Chamber, Parliament Building at 4 p.m. yesterday. The occasion marked the first official visit of His Grace to the Province.

On arrival, the Archbishop was presented to the Administrator by Dr. George C. Fisher. This was followed by the presentation of Premier Matheson, who in turn presented the members of his Government and the Mayors of Charlottetown and Summerside. The Primate was accompanied by the Right Reverend Robert Harold Waterman, B.A., D.D., Bishop of Nova Scotia, within whose jurisdiction the Anglican clergy of P. E. Island are contained. His Lordship and several members of the Island clergy also met the Government and civic officials.

"The greatest testimony to the Grace of God is your presence in church," said the Archbishop in his address to the members of St. Paul's Anglican Church, who gathered for a service at 8 p.m. last night as he preached the sermon at St. Paul's Church. Choosing as his text "To testify the Gospel of the Grace of God," he said it was inspired by St. Barnabas and the apostles, and he humorously noted that Anglicans would be lost without a celebrant to keep them aware of celebration.

The Primate said that when the worship of God in His House is real and sincere it has the power to convert. He cited the Biblical instance of Barnabas being sent by the priests to Antioch because they were not sure that Paul was completely orthodox in his preaching in his church. Barnabas went as an ambassador but he attended the services unknown to Paul and later told the priests "There I saw the Grace of God, and I am glad."

Rev. Barfoot remarked that it was always possible to tell a church which was loved, cared for, worshipped in and lived in: just one could tell the same things of a home. A place where children liked to be and where rest might be sought. In this connection he said that Barnabas was the epitome of consolation, comfort and helpfulness.
