THE PRESENT WAR.

Sir,—I notice by reports through the Associated Press (no: the most dependable source) that the British people and press are in sympathy with the United States in the present war with Spain. Now Sir, if such is the case, there is in my opinion only two solutions to the above mentioned mystery. The first, a lamentable ignorance of the true facts of the case; the second, which would be much more deplorable, that they have lost their idea, or sense, of British fair play, for which they are accented the world over. When the United States remonstrated with Spain against the state of affairs in Cuba Spain granted an armistice, and then offered Cuba a government, or constitution, such as obtains in our Dominion, fifty per cent (by the way) better than that existing south of the line. But no; she must withdraw from Cuba altogether, leaving the Island free and independent. Is that the way, I ask, that the seceding States were treated by the then government of this great republic? I trow not, notwithstanding the clause in their constitution that any state, or states, might withdraw from the federation at any time. Many will tell you today, that their civil war was to free the slaves, in which case there would be a kind of consistency in their present attitude. But such was not the case, for an act to that effect was not passed until the fourth year of the struggle. We have reason to believe that the atrocities we read of being perpetrated in Cuba were much exaggerated and the wanton destruction of property was mostly the work of insurgents. Had Spain demanded six or seven million dollars of the United States for the assistance given the rebels in Cuba, in men, arms and encouragement, international law would have borne her out in so doing. Else, on what grounds, did the United States claim indemnity from Great Britain in the Alabama case, which claim was allowed to the amount of over ten million dollars by the arbitrators. I is open to question, and doubted by many, whether the Cubans would have taken up arms at all were it not for the prompting of the United States citizens.

Now, Sir, in the face of these facts above mentioned, I ask, by what right or under what law does the United States carry on war against Spain, for certainly the latter was not the aggressor. They wish it to appear that the declaration of war was for the Cubans. Not so, for Cuba would be nearer the truth. The Newcastle Chronicle is rather near the mark in saying that it is not humanitarianism in heroes but hypocrisy in hysterics. And further "To assail a weary man were sham," but to strike one who is down sick and too weak to raise, is barbarous,—aggravated when sufferer is non-offensive. It is said in Connaught that it is not fair for one to fall upon twenty, but in this case twenty have fallen upon one and that without cause.

Re Greek vs. Turkey the case was reversed. The people leaped the bounds of reason and ran away with their Government. But in the present instance the governing and governed appear alike which goes to show that which the experience of ages has taught that a "government by the people for the people and of the people" is generally unstable and always taut with disaster.

The United States has drawn the sword, thrown away the scabbard and the national honor with it. In one sense, it resembles a mob, in that they will listen to anything or every thing with the exception of reason or justice. There is no great difficulty in tracing a resemblance between the Armistice of '95 and '96 and the Spanish day. Her territories are invaded, her towns are bombarded, her sons slain, and her ships and cargoes seized at sea. There is this difference the Armenians was clubbed or shot while peacefully employed or while running for his life; while the Spaniard is shot or shelled while standing in defence of his country against overwhelming odds. Truly does the socialist's organ of Berlin pronounce it, on the United States part, as unjust a war as ever was waged; and such, beyond a doubt, will be the language of posterity. The United States has added another dark blot to the page of the Nineteenth Century, who now stoops his venerable form in sorrow and who will shortly depart, grieving to think that he has been so little better than some of his less favored predecessors, and that, too, "after all the sunshine so far foretold." Alas! alas! what a gloom is thrown over our late brightening prospects of reaching a higher civilization.

TOUCHED BY THEIR BRAVERY.

Admiral Cervera Affected

BY THE HEROIC CONDUCT OF THE AMERICANS.

Lieut. Hobson and Party Swam Ashore and Were Captured.

With the fleet off Santiago de Cuba June 4, 7 p. m., via Kingston, Ja., June 6, (delayed in transmission).—All the members of the Merrimac expedition are safe two are slightly wounded, but Lieut. Hobson escaped without a scratch.

This good news was brought out to Rear Admiral Sampson by Admiral Cervera's chief of staff, under a flag of truce.

"Admiral Cervera," said Captain Bascom, "is so touched by the bravery of your men that he felt it only right, you should know that they are alive. They are prisoners of war and are being well treated."

The names of the two wounded men were not ascertained. One has a slight wound on the cheek and the other in the hip.

After blowing up the Merrimac Lieut. Hobson and his party swam ashore and were captured.

FOUR MILES FROM MANILA.

Movements of Insurgents

SPANISH REGIMENT MUTINIES AND SHOOTS ITS OFFICERS.

A Thousand Prisoners Brought to Cavite by Insurgents.

Hong Kong, June 7.—The British gunboat Swift, which has just arrived from Manila, reports that the insurgents have cut the railways outside the town and advanced to within four miles of the city.

A Spanish regiment has mutinied and shot its officers.

Fighting between the insurgents and the Spanish troops is frequent, and the former brought a thousand prisoners to Cavite.

The Americans, it is reported at Manila, assist the insurgents with boats and machine guns.

The Swift reports a rumor that the insurgents have captured and tortured a number of priests.

The British residents at the time the Swift left still remained in Manila but the other foreigners were taking refuge on the foreign shipping.

TWENTY-FOUR SHIPS SAID TO BE ENGAGED.

Firing Ceased After About Three Hours—Details Not Known.

HAVANA, June 7.—At eight o'clock yesterday morning twenty-four vessels of the American fleet opened fire upon the fortifications at the entrance to Santiago harbor and along the coast line. The firing ceased about eleven o'clock; Further details are not yet known here.
