## Reefer Shortage Said Worst Ever

Government transportation officials say the current extreme shortage of refrigerated railway cars in the province "was unexpected and apparently is due to a mix-up somewhere along the railway supply line."

The shortage is the worst ever experienced at this time of year. One Charlottetown potato dealer, terming the situation "ridiculous", said yesterday he doubted if there were "as many as

four or five reefers available in the whole province."

At this time of year, with heavy movement of potatoes out of the province, between 40 and 50 refrigerated cars are needed daily. Statistics available from government showed that in May 1964, there were 1,209 refrigerated carloads of potatoes shipped from the province.

It is unlawful to make unnecessary noise with a horn, by squealing tires, or with a muffler.

Any motor vehicle over 80 inches in width, if operated at night, must carry, for emergencies, three red flares and three red fuses, or three red electric lanterns.

Any motor vehicle used in the transportation of flammable liquids in bulk or compressed flammable gases, when operated at night, must carry three red electric lanterns. NOTE: In each of the above cases, the required flares, fuses and lamps may be replaced by three portable reflector units approved by the Registrar of Motor Vehicles.

## New Proposal For AWF Would Up Prize Money

Handsome first prize awards of \$100 will be available in dairy cattle classes if the Atlantic Winter Fair accepts the proposal of Agriculture Minister Harry Hays to pay one-half the prize money, providing the fair agrees to the classes he has suggested. Beef cattle awards will also be up sharply.

The fair will be held this year Oct. 30 to Nov. 6 with total prize money of more than \$60,000, double that of a year ago, according to R.C. Parent, Charlottetown who is a director of the AWF.

President Don Oland told the fair directors at Halifax this week that the fair will have to adopt "schedule 2" for prize awards if they accept the Hays proposal. The schedule that

must be adopted is tied in directly with the amount of prize money that was available last year in the various classes. And schedule 2 indicates a first prize of \$100, with \$90 for second, \$75 for third, \$60 for fourth, \$50 for fifth, \$40 for sixth, \$35 for seventh, \$30 for eighth, \$25 for ninth and \$20 for 10th placing. (This schedule will only be followed, though, if the Hays arrangement is accepted.)

It is schedule 3 that will apply in the dairy classes for the Provincial Exhibition here, by comparison, and the first prize award is only \$70 and it is graduated down to a 10th prize of \$10.

A total of \$525 is available for each class in schedule 2, and the available prize money for class in schedule 3 is \$350.

The AWF lost \$24,000 in its first year of operation, in 1963, and dropped almost \$25,000 last year. But for this year they have \$9,000 in grants available from the three Maritime Provinces which will likely mean matching federal grants, also a federal grant of \$1,000 for youth work and of \$500 for judges' honorarium. This will mean a total of \$19,500 in grants, if the federal share comes through as is expected.

A meeting of Island exhibitors will be held in Charlottetown early in June, when officials of the AWF will explain the new regulations and plans for this fall's fair. Mr. Parent told The Guardian.

## Births Down Marriages, Deaths Increase

OTTAWA — The Dominion Bureau of Statistics reports Prince Edward Island had fewer births, but more marriages and deaths in the first three months of 1965 than in the corresponding period last year.

Births totalled 573 this year compared to 620 in 1964, a decline of 7.6 per cent. But marriages numbered 73 compared to 66, an increase of 10.3 per cent, and deaths were 249 compared to 242, a rise of 2.9 per cent.

In March alone, P.E.I. births numbered 203 compared to 198 in March last year; marriages were more than double at 27 compared to 13; and deaths totalled 76 compared to 74.
