The Alliance Fire Assurance Company of England has appointed Mr. D. B. Stewart, general agent for this province. Mr. F. H. Arnaud was the Company's former agent.

It is understood that during the absence of Hon. Mr. Ives in England, for the benefit of his health, Sir Mackenzie Bowell will act as minister of trade and commerce.

Hon. Mr. Ouimet will act temporarily as minister of agriculture.

Dr. Lathen has retired from the editorial chair of the Examiner. Western. The St. John Sun remarks that he has preserved a kindly spirit toward all Christian bodies, and has not even given evidence of Christianity by going out of his way to assail the Roman Catholic Church.

Prof. Robertson will arrive at Summerside this evening. He will be accompanied by Mr. A. P. McLaren, a veteran cheese dealer. During Professor Robertson's stay he will address public meetings at Alberton and Cardigan. It is expected that Mr. McLaren will also speak at these meetings.

Professor Charles G. D. Roberts, lately professor of English literature and economics in King's College, Windsor, has been honored by election to a fellowship of the Royal Society of Literature of London. This society, of which the late Lord Tennyson was president, is after the society for the advancement of science, the oldest and perhaps the most distinguished of all the royal societies of England. There are only two, or at most three, other Canadians on the roll of membership. Professor Roberts is a native of New Brunswick—one of the many who reflect credit upon their native Province.

SAVED BY THE UNION JACK. The British steamer Ardanhan, arrived at New York from Cuban ports on Thursday last. Captain Walker says that while the Ardanhan lay in Girona on June 19, Frank Woodward, claiming to be an American citizen, and a correspondent of the New York Morning Journal, came on board and placed himself under the protection of the British flag. He complained that he had been in the mountains with the rebel army for the purpose of obtaining information in the pursuance of his duty as a newspaper correspondent. He was twice captured by the Spanish soldiers, but escaped. When he attempted to leave the rebel camp Gen. Mace detained him and endeavored to have him remain as an officer. After several attempts he finally escaped, and made his way to the port of Banes. There he parted with his horse and took passage on a Spanish steamer for Girona. He had been deprived of all funds and papers. On his arrival at Girona he appealed to the United States consular agent, Jose H. Bela, a Spanish merchant and an officer in the Spanish army. He explained his condition and asked protection as an American subject until he got a vessel to New York, fearing immediate imprisonment. The consular agent refused to recognize him as an American citizen. He declined to investigate Woodward's story by communicating with Santiago de Cuba, where Woodward stated his papers had been filed with Consul Hyatt, and insultingly declared that all American reporters were hired by Cubans to write lies. He strongly recommended Woodward to give himself up to the Spanish, which would have meant close confinement. Capt. Walker promised him protection under the British flag in the face of all obstacles, and took him away.

LOSBOY, July 12.—Sir William Harcourt and wife, while returning from a political meeting in a carriage today, were vigorously pelted with cabbage stalks and rubbish while passing through a rough suburb of Derby. Both were hit but not injured.

LOSBOY, July 12.—In the shooting at Biele today for the Kolarup Cup, the rifle team representing Great Britain won with a score of 638, to 618 for Canada and 596 for Guernsey. The loss of the cup is a keen disappointment to the Canadians, though Major Markham, the commandant, says the Canadians were severely handicapped by a fish tail gale. Last year the score of 699 won for Britain; this year it was 638, Canada 618, and Guernsey 601. In this wind continues Canada will score lower in all the contests.

BRITAIN, July 12.—A disastrous conflagration occurred yesterday at Broterre, a village in Hesse, Nassau. Three hundred and fifty houses were destroyed. Ten villagers were killed while seeking to rescue valuables. Two thousand persons are homeless.

LOSBOY, July 12.—The Times publishes its initial report of British crops. It says that owing to prolonged drought the condition of all crops except hops compare most unfavorably with the condition prevailing July 1, 1894. A comparative table gives the following: Wheat 72.5 in 1895 to 101.8 in 1894; barley 83 in 1895 to 102.9 in 1894; oats 76.4 in 1895 to 105.4 in 1894.
