

Address Given at W. I. Convention By Conference Delegate

Mrs. Malcolm MacLeod, past president of Prince Edward Island Women's Institute, voiced emphatic warning that Canadians are headed for curtailment of liberty and a change in our way of life, unless we alter our way of thinking, and "think what we can do for Canada, not what Canada can do for us."

Mrs. MacLeod was speaking to a district convention of Women's Institutes on Wednesday evening at Irishtown Hall, and was holding her audience spellbound, as she recorded for the 28th time for the edification and entertainment of a convention audience, her experiences on a trip to Europe as an A.C.W.W. delegate to Copenhagen.

Speaking briefly on the different points visited, she was impressed in London to find St. Paul's Cathedral standing unscathed in the midst of total ruin all around. Visiting the British House of Commons to see Winston Churchill, she was fortunate enough to see all the important people so well known by name.

Paris, she found to be a "beautiful city, so gay in spite of the fact that for so long it was occupied by the Germans." But France is an unhappy country, deprived of the power of its manhood by two wars, and with no stable government.

In Copenhagen, a most amazing spectacle was the hundreds of bicycles on the streets. Mothers carried babies in baskets on the handle bars, and as soon as they are a little older, they too ride bicycles. Beauty and cleanliness are notable in the buildings and in the streets. A special service was held in Copenhagen Cathedral for the delegates where the vicar was a woman and which was attended by the King and Queen.

Mrs. MacLeod explained that the conference dealt with removal of tariffs and restrictions so that food may be moved from countries with a surplus to countries that need it. 25 millions have been voted by Canada for each of six years to raise the standard of living in underdeveloped areas. In such places conditions are so bad that these countries will turn to any one who will promise something better, as they feel it cannot be worse.

In Holland the delegates were entertained in Dutch homes where they found the people content with what they have. They do things for themselves, and enjoy every minute. After five years, the Dutch have not forgotten to be grateful for their liberation from the Germans by Canadians, and even the bus driver said he was proud to drive Canadian women.

The speaker pictured the Dutch people living on farms of from five to ten acres, making the most of what they had and using what they had with contentment. When she came back to Canada and looked at P. E. Island, as she said it fresh from Holland, and said, "I'll tell you frankly, I didn't like what I saw." Beef, pork, eggs, poultry—everything was a good price but potatoes, and we "were making an awful poor cry." We went to Ottawa for help in spite of the fact that the Government had warned us not to go to Ottawa. "There is danger in going to the Government. Every time you go to the Government for help, you give up so much, and there are people in Canada today, waiting for us to give up too much—we must alter our way of thinking, and think what can we do for Canada, not what Canada can do for us. We must be willing to work. We must teach our children that and economy, and we really have a wonderful future in Canada."

Enjoyable comedy is furnished throughout the play by a tin-badge detective, Abner Jenkins (Emmitt Trainor) and Sally Snodgrass (Marion Cairns), the maid of all work at the Hazelton's.

The part of Mrs. Hazelton is well played by Nora Trainor and the part of Sheriff Luke Higgins, a man with a past, was competently taken by G. R. McKenna.

Wherever the play is shown, many favorable comments are heard regarding the skilful acting of the various actors, the attractive stage setting, and the perfection of the staging of this play with its really worthwhile story.
