\$39,579 In Subscriptions To Hospital Fund Received

Subscriptions totalling \$39,579 have been received through July 31 in the public campaign solicitation for the Prince County Hospital Completion Fund, its general chairman, William Hayward announced yesterday.

Of this audited amount, \$26,087 came from 38 district committees and \$13,491 was received from the 10 Summerside teams. Mr. Hayward stated yesterday afternoon that "although the public campaign organization will have no more formal meetings, each of the 48 district committees should continue their solicitation until their respective quotas are attained."

Pointing out that only two of the 38 districts have completed their coverage, he also emphasized that no reports as yet have been turned in by the 18 other districts out of a total of 56 groups organized to represent the hospital's wide area of service.

The general chairman announced that the fund office will be kept open until further notice, from one to five, Mondays through Fridays; and that reports and subscription forms will be turned in there or to the fund treasurer, J. L. Gorrill—S.
