Fire Damages Tractor, Shed

Fire caused damage to a tractor and milk house on the farm of Walter MacQuarrie, Brackley Point Road at approximately 6:30 a.m. yesterday.

The fire is believed to have started from the tractor which was located inside the milk house. On arrival of the Brackley Point fire department, Mr. and Mrs. MacQuarrie had succeeded in removing the tractor from the building. Firemen were at the scene for approximately three-quarters of an hour.

Blind Council Holds Annual Conference

A successful 14th Maritimes Conference of the Canadian Council of the Blind was held in Truro last weekend.

Attending the conference from the Island were J. Edgar Donoate, recreation director and Miss Violet Daley, both of the Charlottetown Friendship Club of the Blind.

The mission were held in immediate consultation with the government and a budget and presentation of awards on Saturday night.

Mr. Donoate reported that six clubs took part in inter-club bowling tournaments, and that more entries were expected for this particular sport next year.

Reporting on a brief to the government as a non-profit organization, requesting that all blind receive an allowance of \$100 per month, Mr. Donoate stated that the means test, Robert Howard, New Glasgow, said that this had not been granted but his committee would continue to press for the elimination of the means test. Student At PWC To Tour Europe

Jan Robertson, 18, of Charlottetown, winner in 1961 of a \$1500 scholarship donated by R.T. Holman Ltd., and an IOBE bursary valued at \$1,600, has been selected as Prince Edward Island's representative among Canadian students who will be touring Poland this summer.

The tour, sponsored by World University Students Council, goes underway in Montreal June 27 and includes a five-day stay in Holland and a bus trip through West Germany and Magistrate A. Haslam, enroute to Poland.

Jan has been top student in his class for the past three years at Prince of Wales College and previously attended West Kent School where he won the Governor-General's Medal in grade 10.

Last year, he was selected as the first winner of the newly-established Holman Scholarship which provides \$200 per year towards his education for a five-year period. In addition \$200 per year goes to the university of the winner's choice as a subsidy to help educate him.

The Holman scholarship is awarded on the basis of merit only, not according to financial need. It is held by a student for the full five years as long as his scholastic standing is maintained.

Jan was one of three Island students to be awarded a bursary from the IOBE Second World War Memorial Trust fund.

The bursaries, each valued at \$1,600, are awarded to sons and daughters, who are residents in Canada, whose father or mother served in the Second World War and as a result of such service, suffered death or permanent disability.

Jan, the son of the late Major A.S. Robertson and Mrs. Robertson, will return to Prince of Wales College in the fall to take a straight arts course and the following year will likely be attending either Carleton or Queens University to study arts, majoring in history.

Covehead Man Re-Arrested After 1st Charge Dismissed

In a police court yesterday, a charge of uttering a forged document was dismissed against Edward Lloyd MacDonnell, Covehead, by Magistrate A.J. Haslam.

But apparently that will not be the last court appearance for MacDonnell, for immediately after the conclusion of the court session, he was re-arrested by Deputy Chief of Police Steve Webster on a charge of false pretences.

In the charge on which he was dismissed, MacDonnell was charged with uttering a forged document, a cheque on the Dominion Provincial Bank in the amount of \$250, payable to John Smith.

John P. Nicholson was defence counsel, while the case for the prosecution was Alan X. Scobie.

Also represented by Mr. Nicholson, Edgar Kenneth Rogers, East Royalty, was charged with uttering a forged document, a cheque on the Dominion Provincial Bank in the amount of \$100, payable to John Smith.
