There is still a lot of hay to be harvested. The frequent showers of rain are prolonging the job and making so much more work for the farmers.

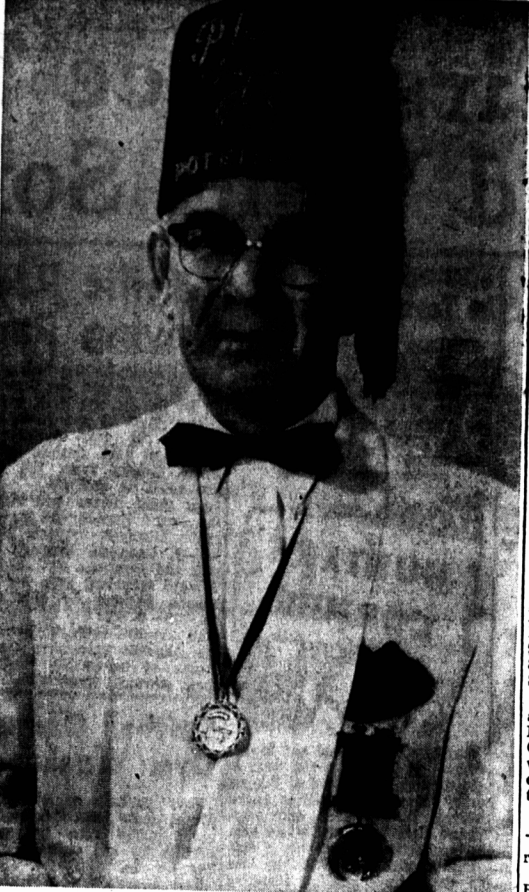
Mr. Stanley Millar was visiting relatives at Charlie Stewart's in Little Sands last week.

Provincial Objective Passed In 1955 Red Cross Campaign

It was officially announced last evening by Mr. Walter R. Shaw that the 1955 Red Cross Campaign, of which he is the Provincial chairman, has reached \$27,600, which is 73% of its objective of \$37,400.

Mr. Shaw remarked, "There are a few districts in the Province from which we still expect to receive returns. This will certainly be all to the good since the amount raised in the Campaign in this province does not begin to cover Red Cross expenditures in P.E.I. which yearly have to be subsidized by the National Headquarters."

A report just received from National Headquarters in Toronto reveals that Prince Edward Island is the third province to exceed its objective in the 1955 Campaign with Manitoba and Newfoundland in first and second place with 114.75 and 114.08%. Up to the present time 96.04% of the National objective has been reached with the other seven provinces in the following positions: Ontario, 97.49%; British Columbia, 95.91%; Alberta, 93.83%; Quebec, 92.14%; Nova Scotia, 89.54%; New Brunswick, 89.25%; and Saskatchewan, 84.65%.

Mr. Walter Shaw has received a congratulatory wire from the National Red Cross Campaign Chairman, Mr. D. Bruce Shaw, in which he pays tribute to the excellent response received from the "wonderful Islanders."

The collection made at the most recent "Pay Parade" at the R.C. A.F. Station in Summerside, which had not been canvassed during the regular Campaign time in March, helped the province materially in reaching its objective.

All who were associated with Mr. Shaw in any way in the 1955 Red Cross Campaign will join with him in a feeling of satisfaction in a worthwhile job well done.

Says Gregg Will Retire From Cabinet This Autumn

OTTAWA (CP) - The Ottawa Citizen says reports on Parliament Hill are that Labor Minister Gregg will retire from the cabinet this autumn to become lieutenant-governor of New Brunswick.

Mr. Gregg, member of Parliament for York-Sudbury since 1947, is New Brunswick's representative in the cabinet. He now is in Europe.

The newspaper says Lieutenant-Governor David L. MacLaren has been in office 10 years, "an unusually long time."

Mr. Gregg, a former sergeant-at-arms of the House of Commons and president of the University of New Brunswick.

The Citizen said: "The reports today were that Mr. Gregg was anxious to take the post of lieutenant-governor and that Mr. (prime minister) St. Laurent might consent to releasing him from his present duties."
