## Dodgers Dump Flyers 6-1 In Game Last Evening

The Dodgers dumped the Flyers 6-1 last night at Memorial Field behind the five-hit pitching of their ace right-hander Paul Jay.

Jay was working on a shutout going into the ninth but the batter up, Kip Ready, laced out a double and scored on Bernie Gallant's triple to break the goose egg.

The Dodgers jumped on Lefty Perry in the first inning for two walks and a double that were good for one run. After Perry struck out Whitlock with two men on, Fiddler MacDonald took in Kip Ready from first to clear the bases. Ready hit the next batter, Brian McCallum banged out a double and drove across two more runs. The Dodgers added two more in the second and two in again.

## McCluskey Wins By Split Decision Over Skinner

Louis "Cobey" McCluskey appeared to be the stronger and more confident of the two when he won a split decision over Jimmy Skinner in the main event of a great card of fighting at the Forum last night and witnessed by a full house of fans.

Judge George Hooper scored the fight 8-2 for McCluskey, while Judge Danny McCormack scored 6-3-1 for McCluskey and Judge Ed Smith scored two rounds to each fighter with two even.

In the semi-final Don Trainer of Charlotte town beat Billy Crawford before he belted him away at the 1:57 mark of the first round and Gaston Roy won a three-round T.K.O. over Artie Chorbak of New York.

The first round of the main event opened with both fighters feeling each other out and Skinner showing flashes of his aggressive traits he carried through the eighth and tenth rounds, when he was stalked by McCluskey.

The tenth round was the best of the fight as both fighters stood toe-to-toe in the center of the ring and traded punches. McCluskey was counter-punching sharply and both he and the American were landing some solid blows.

Don Trainer wasted no time in disposing of young Billy Crawford as right from the bell he was pouring in and landing sharp blows. A terrific right uppercut sent Crawford to the canvas and when he got up Trainer was on him again and put him down once more.

After that Crawford was sent to the canvas by a right hand roundhouse punch that landed on his forehead and Trainer had little trouble belting him out for the count.

Gaston Roy and Artie Chorbak put on what was possibly the most crowd-pleasing show of the night. They were two of a kind and kept the large crowd roaring throughout with their slug king.

Although Chorbak looked to be the stronger of the two he began to fade quickly after a sharp exchange in the second round and Roy continued his torrential punching. MILWAUKEE, (AP)—Stan The Man Musial of St. Louis Cardinals lined a 375-foot home run into the right field bleachers on the first pitch of the bottom half of the 12th inning Tuesday to give the National League a 6-5 comeback victory over the American League in the 22nd all-star game.

Musial's smash set an all-star record for it was his fourth in 12 games, the most ever played by any man since the late Arch Ward dreamed up the series back in 1933. Until he broke up the ball game, Musial hadn't had a hit.

Trailing 5-0 as late as the seventh inning, the Nationals clawed back to win after they had been counted out. Mickey Mantle's tremendous 425-foot blast into the center field stands with two men on climaxed a four-run spurt by the Americans in the first inning.

CLUTCH PITCHING  
 Cincinnati's Gene Conley, the ultimate winner, curled the ball around their fingers while the Nationals closed the series gap to 13-9 in favor of the American.

Musial's winning blow provided a smashing climax to Milwaukee's first taste of all-star play. Most of the 45,843 fans knew the American only by reading about them in the papers. They were willing to believe all their fine press notices in the early innings while the Nationals floundered in bitter frustration.

Conley, the towering 6-8 right-hander who has won 11 games for the Milwaukee Braves, had just taken up the pitching burden in the 12th inning. Nuxhall, the Cincinnati lefty who was used in relief in regular season play Saturday and Tuesday, had stopped the Americans dead for 3-1-3 in the first two innings.

ONE LEFT  
 At the end of the second extra-inning game in the series history, manager Leo Durocher had used everybody on his 25-man squad except Luis Arroyo, the St. Louis lefty. He had to let pitchers bat for themselves in the late stages.

Conley, who had worked a full nine-inning game Sunday, simply threw that ball past the opposition in his one-inning stand. Detroit's Al Kline, Washington's Mickey Vernon and Cleveland's Al Rosen all struck out.

Then Musial stepped to the plate to face Boston's Frank Sullivan, the fourth American in a League pitcher. One pitch, one home run. It was as simple as that.

WARM WELCOME  
 No world series winner ever received a warmer welcome than Musial. The entire National bench—manager, coaches and players—waited for him to touch home plate as the Americans struggled off the field.

A costly error by Chicago's Chico Carrasquel who fumbled a grounder and then threw away the ball, trying for a force play, cost the Americans a run in the seventh. Another error by Rosen who let Kline's throw get through him at third base permitted the Cubs' Ransford Jackson to score the tying run in the eighth. In each case there were two out before the Nationals scored.

The fans contributed to a gross gate of \$179,545.50 (net \$163,254.02). The receipts, plus \$110,000 from the radio-television rights go into the major leagues' central fund which supports the player pension fund.

Mantle's 425-foot homer with two men on base in the first inning looked like the ball game until the Nationals came out of their daze. One run already had scored on a wild pitch by Philadelphia's Robin Roberts before the New York Yankee centerfielder connected to complete a four-run inning.

The American lead was stretched to two in the sixth on a combination of a single by Yankee Yogi Berra, a double by Kline and an infield out by Mickey Vernon of Washington. The double by Kline was a hot smash off the left wrist of Eddie Mathews, Milwaukee's third baseman, that bounced into left field. Mathews left the game in the next inning for a trip to the hospital where x-rays of the wrist showed he had escaped a fracture.

PITTSBURGH (AP)—The Pittsburgh Pirates Tuesday signed two rookie players to one-year contracts in its minor league system.

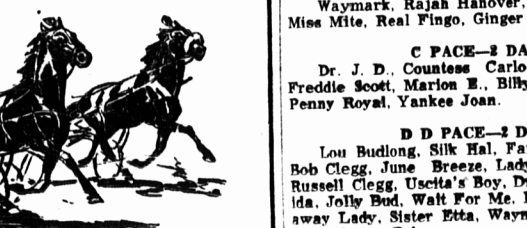
