Supreme Court.

FRIDAY, July 29.

The application of Hugh Ramsay praying that the Supreme Court of this Province should quash an order nisi and order absolute granted thereon by Judge Kelly of the County Court of Prince County, whereby an unconditional order of discharge from bankruptcy granted to the said Hugh Ramsay under the Insolvent Act of 1875 and amending acts was set aside. This application was argued today before the full Court, which decided unanimously that the said orders made by the said County Judge were granted without jurisdiction, and should be quashed, and the same were accordingly quashed. McLeod, Morson and McQuarrie for the Summerside Bank; Mr. H. C. McDonald and the Attorney General for Mr. Ramsay.

The Court this morning directed that McTague, in whose case judgment was reserved, be admitted to bail until the judgment is given.

The Queen vs. Charles Cannon—Tried June term at S'ide. Convicted for assault to prevent arrest. The Court refuses the motion in arrest of judgment. N. McLeod, Q. C., for prisoner. Atty. General for Crown. The prisoner will receive sentence at next October term at Summerside.

Roach Buote vs. Edward C. Maxfield—Tried 2 years ago at Summerside. The Court refuses bail for non trial without costs. Mr. W. S. Stewart for plaintiff. Mr. A. McLean for deft.

John Longworth vs James Clow—Action of ejectment. Verdict for pliff. Mr. Davies, Q. C., moved for non suit or new trial.

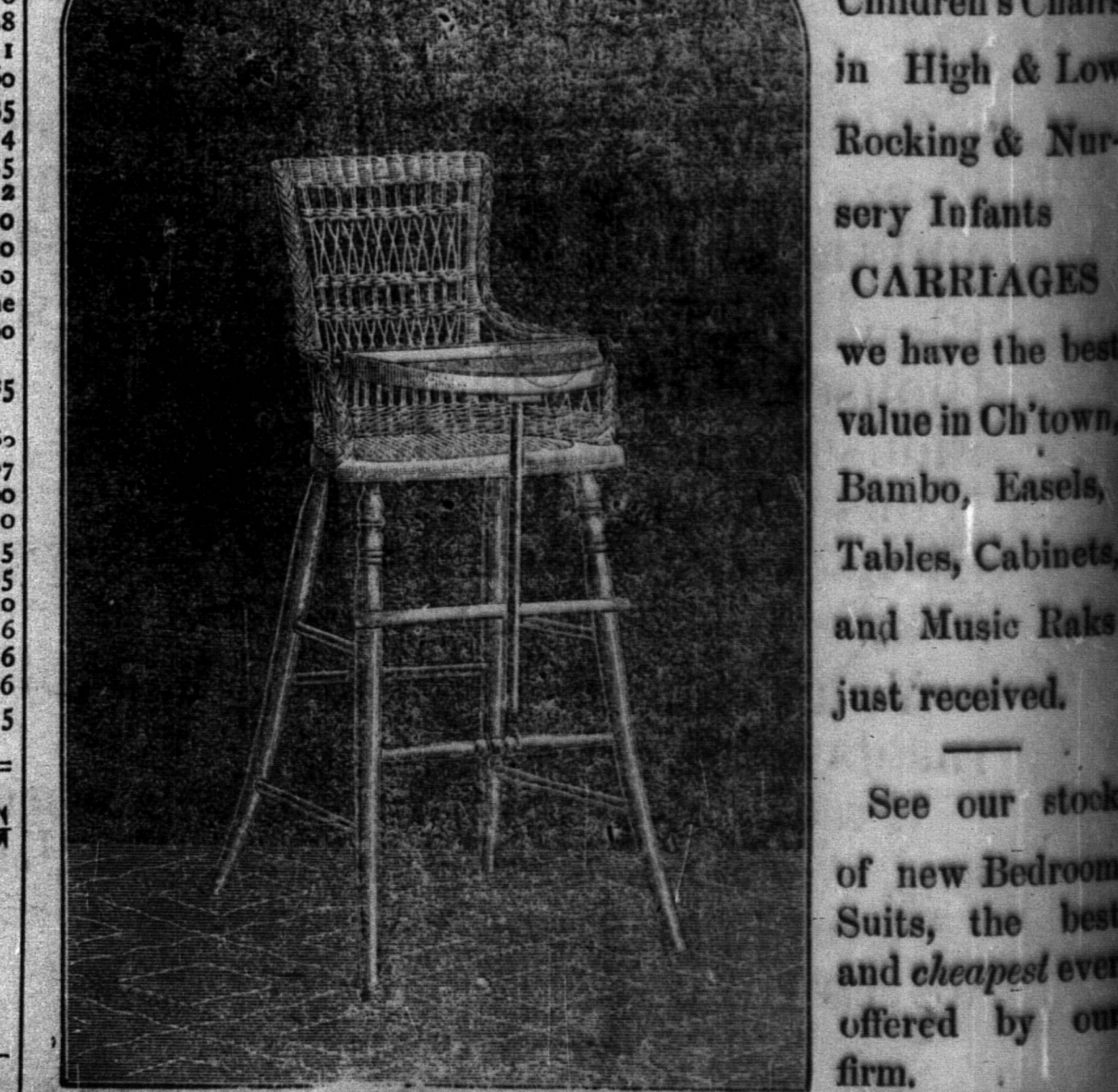
