

Saints Win Exhibition Rugby Game From RCAF

A clocklike working Saint Dunstan's University Intermediate football team hung a 21-3 defeat on a Royal Air Force team from the Summerside Station Saturday afternoon on the S. D. U. field.

The Eldon Green coached Saints breezed into a 13-0 lead in the first half and picked another 10 points in the final chapter. The airmen scored their only try following a long run in the early stages of the second half.

The visitors were handicapped by their lack of the knowledge of the game. In addition a number of their team were missing due to flying duties. Each team played a man short in the second half. The Saints too were missing several key players who were with the Intercollegiate squad at Fredericton.

Aquinas Ryan, a stocky forward with a good burst of speed, opened the scoring for the Saints when he broke through the airmen's line for a 35 yard run to place the ball directly behind the uprights. Jackie Reardon made the convert.

Saints went into a 10-0 lead near the end of the half when "Hammer" Deighan scored after taking a neat pass from Rodney MacInnis. The play followed a scrum from about 40 yards out with MacInnis making a good run. The convert from a difficult angle, was made by Reardon.

Deighan made the score 13-0 minutes later. The Summerside born picking quarter picked the ball from the scrum and plunged over from about two yards out.

Lamonte, a speedy airforce wingman made the visiting team's score possible with a 40 yard run down the side of the field. The airmen dribbled the ball over the line with Spalding falling on it for the try.

up and placed the ball between the posts.

Wingman Paul Jay scored the last try on a play started by Mooney. Jay ratched about 25 yards to score in the corner.

Hicks, the airforce fullback displayed some of the finest tackling seen here for some time. He hauled down several Saints with low tackles when he was the only man left to beat.
