Let's Talk It Over

A Prince County Viewpoint by "d"

A few days ago a very large van was parked on Water Street in Summerside just east of its intersection with Summer. The van was parked on the north side and made just about the blindest crossing that anyone could imagine. Blind crossings are a menace to traffic safety even at points where trains can be normally expected only two or three times a day, but when this blind crossing is created where cars are passing at an average of about four or five a minute the danger becomes much more acute. Making a left turn at this intersection while the van was parked there was something like spinning the cylinder of a revolver which contained one cartridge, putting the muzzle to your ear and pulling the trigger.

We don't know if there is a law against vans parking in such places or not, but if there isn't, there should be. Let's beat the recommendations of the coroner's jury this time and see to it. If there is such a law, we can't understand the van's driver getting away with such lawbreaking. The van stood out like the Woolworth Building in New York. A law enforcement officer could not have failed to see it.

It looks as if the summer of 1951 is going to be a banner one in so far as welcoming strangers to our shores is concerned. Charlottetown's Festive Week will no doubt attract large numbers to the Garden of the Gulf. We realize this bit of advice is akin to advising the rose to perk up and look beautiful. Island hospitality has made a name for itself in the world that lies beyond the waters that wash our coast. Our roads may have disintegrated in the last few years but our welcome mat is as bright and attractive as ever. This doesn't mean that we don't have to keep working at it.

"What is so rare as a day in June?" Jun is thought by many to be the loveliest month of the year. There are some who will vote for September, and if October is particularly well-behaved, it can provide quite an argument too. But we believe the majority of people will name June as the nonpareil. What a pity, then, that it is the month in which most school children must study hardest of all. Is it any wonder that some children grow rebellious at staying indoors and studying when the wonder and witchery of June is beckoning to them from every window sill? It is surely not a month to inspire the young to get better acquainted with equilateral triangles, irregular Latin verbs or the products of Guatemala.

Daily Work For Prisoners Suggested By Grand Jury

At the opening of the June term of the Supreme Court in Summerside yesterday the Grand Jury found a true bill in the cases of Cecil Arsenault and Clarence Cahill of Summerside, charged with robbery with violence. They were arraigned and pleaded not guilty. Their trial will commence this morning at eleven o'clock.

Two other cases were also disposed of. In the civil action of David McCormack vs Alexander A. Lecky, an action for damages resulting from a car-truck collision judgment was given for the plaintiff in the amount of \$449.88. The plaintiff was also allowed tax costs less the sum of \$65.00. The plaintiff was represented by Mr. R. S. Hinton, K.C. and the defendant by Mr. E. H. Strong, K.C. This case had been heard previously and judgment was reserved till yesterday.

In the appeal of the King (respondent) vs Charles MacKenzie (appellant) the conviction of the magistrate on a charge of drunk driving was confirmed but sentence was reduced from two months to one month. Counsel for the appellant, Mr. R. R. Bell, K.C., advised the court that he would admit the conviction but asked for reduction of the sentence. The Attorney General, Hon. W. E. Darby, K.C. agreed to the one month term, that being the minimum permitted as it was a second offence.

There was one other civil case on the docket: John Leaman Campbell and Edgar Reeves vs British American Oil Co. Ltd. and this was set down for trial on July 10th.

Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, who presided, outlined their duties to the members of the Grand Jury. He said they would inspect the Court House and jail building and report particularly on how those detained in the jail are kept and cared for. They should also report in a general way on conditions of law observance throughout the country. He commented that there is a general absence of serious crime in the county and this is due, in large measure, to the fact that petty offenses are checked before they can develop into serious crime. He said that the most disquieting factor is that the offenders are often juveniles and they can't be dealt with in the same way as hardened criminals and the problem is a difficult one. He then went over the evidence of the indictment before the court.

Grand Jury Report

Following is the grand jury report: "We have examined the premises and have the following recommendations to make: "Repairs to No. 2 furnace and a thorough overhaul of the heating system be made. "We deplore the condition of the windows in the rear of the building and recommend that all broken lights be replaced with heavier glass. Also, we find the prisoners' quarters most depressing, and in keeping with modern reform trends we recommend repainting in a lighter color. "We strongly recommend that the Sheriff of the county be authorized to have minor repairs made up to a value of \$100.00. "We also note with disapproval the condition of the jailor's living quarters and recommend that they be re-decorated and that the pres-
