Loaded Pistol Pointed At His Majesty

FOUR LINERS DEPART WITH VIMY PILGRIMS

Colorful Scene On Montreal Waterfront As 5,000 Embark On Trans-Atlantic Voyage.

MONTREAL, July 16.—(CP)—Somewhere in the St. Lawrence River Canada's pilgrims to Vimy Ridge steamed toward the open sea tonight—more than 5,000 of them aboard four ships that left Montreal at high noon with the greatest sendoff this harbor has ever seen.

Another vessel, the Duchess of Richmond, leaves tomorrow with 1,000 pilgrims to the unweaving of Canada's Great War memorial on Vimy Ridge July 26, but this movement today had no parallel in the history of Montreal's waterfront.

SIDELIGHTS ON VIMY PILGRIMAGE

(By John LeBlanc) (Canadian Press Staff Writer) MONTREAL, July 16.—The veterans are marching back down the misted trail to Vimy, so let's grab him by the side of the road and watch the parade go by. . . must be 10,000 others with us, strung along a half mile of waterfront, as the vets pile aboard the ships. . . they're perched on everything from rooftops to great mountains of bunker coal.

Here's the band playing "Madison" by the ship's side. . . a middle-aged vet's eyes light up and he beats time with a crutch. . . another plops his khaki beret on a steward's head and waltzes him around the deck. . . they plough through paper streamers ankle deep.

TELLS HOW HE SAVED KING'S LIFE

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, July 17.—(Friday)—Morning newspapers devoted whole pages to picture and eye-witness accounts of the apparent attempt on the King's life.

The Daily Mail declared the hero of the occasion was a special constable, Anthony Gordon Dick, 38, who it said struck a revolver from the would-be assassin's hand at the very moment the King rode by.

VATICAN COMMENT

VATICAN CITY, July 16.—(C.P.—Havas)—"It is comforting to note that Divine Providence has preserved His Majesty from all danger," observed Romano, official Vatican organ, wrote tonight in comment on the attempt against the life of King Edward in London today.

Recall Attacks On Lives Of Royalty

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, July 16.—Former attempts on the lives of members of the British Royal Family were recalled tonight by London newspapers, which devoted columns to the story of the man who aimed a revolver at King Edward.

It was recalled that five attempts were made upon the life of Queen Victoria between the years 1840 and 1860, and one in 1882.

The first attempt on the life of Queen Victoria occurred almost at the same spot as today's attempt. It was June 10, 1840. The Queen and Prince Consort Albert were driving along Constitution Hill in an open carriage. A crazy postboy named Oxford fired two pistols. The shots passed close to Prince Albert's head.

Man With Club Foot Taken Into Custody By Police

WOMAN IN GREY KNOCKS WEAPON OUT OF HAND OF WOULD-BE ASSAILANT — Dramatic Interruption Of Military Procession.

ASSASSINATED IN HOSPITAL

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BUCHAREST, Rumania, July 16.—Six students who admitted they were Nazi "iron guards" invaded a hospital today, surrounded the bed of Mihail Stelescu, who was recovering from an appendicitis operation, and killed him with 20 bullets.
