Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Aug. 29. The imports for July aggregate nine and a half millions, and exports twelve millions, of which ten millions and a quarter was the produce of Canada. The deposits in the Post Office Savings Banks increased one quarter of a million dollars during July. Notice is given by the marine Department of the destruction of Point Rich Lighthouse, and the temporary discontinuance of Langlaid's fog alarm. Henry Moore, agricultural editor of the London Times, goes west next week to inspect and report upon the crop prospects of the Northwest. Honours for Lieut. Stairs. HALIFAX, Aug. 29. The city council has appointed a committee consisting of the Mayor and Aldermen with Hon. A. G. Jones, T. E. Kenny, M. P., and Hon. W. S. Fielding to present an address and testimonial to Lieut. Stairs. The committee met this afternoon and decided to honor him with a sword to be manufactured in London of Nova Scotia steel. Hon. Charles Tupper is to be asked to make the presentation. A public meeting will be held here in a week or two, when the address will be given to Lieut. Stairs. Accident to the Steamer William. MONCTON, Aug. 29. The freight steamer William, of Charlottetown, from Sydney to Miramichi, N. B., with coal, put into Bay Verte yesterday for shelter during the storm. When she was coming out this morning she struck on Tormentine Reef and sprang a leak. She was headed for Point du Chevre where she reached this afternoon and was beached to prevent her from sinking. She will have to discharge her cargo to repair. Political Changes. TORONTO, Aug. 29. It is reported that Charles McKenzie, M. P., brother of the ex-premier, will be the next Provincial Treasurer; and Mr. Dryden Minister of Agriculture. The cabinet vacancies will be filled in a few days. A New Club. TORONTO, Aug. 28. Alderman Hallam, a leading Liberal, is the promoter of a new organization called the Reciprocity Club, to do similar work to the anti-Corn Law League and Cobden Club in England.
