

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Sept. 7. Parliament was prorogued to-day. The following is Her Majesty's speech, which was read by royal commission:—

My Lords and Gentlemen:

It is with satisfaction that I find myself at length enabled to release you from your arduous labors. I continue to receive assurances of the most friendly character from all foreign powers. The failure of the Sublime Porte to execute, according to engagement, plans agreed upon in April last for a determination of the Ottoman frontier lying toward Montenegro, has caused unfortunate delays in the settlement of that question; and the Treaty of Berlin has not yet taken effect in other points of importance which remained open at the commencement of the session. The Governments which were parties to that treaty have communicated to the Sultan their judgment on the means of bringing to a satisfactory settlement the Greek and Montenegrin frontier questions; and administrative organization of European provinces of Turkey, and in the principal reforms required in the Asiatic provinces inhabited by Armenians. For the attainment of the objects in view I continue to place reliance on the fact that the concert of Europe has been steadily maintained in regard to the Eastern question, and that the powers which signed the Treaty of Berlin are pressing upon Sublime Porte with all the authority which belongs to their united action, measures which in their belief are best calculated to insure tranquility in the East. I have not been unmindful during the few months which have elapsed since I last addressed you of the consideration which I have stated would guide my policy on the Northwestern frontier of my Indian Empire. Measures have been taken for complete military evacuation of Northern Afghanistan and some progress has been made toward the pacification and settlement of the country. A renewal of hostilities by the Afghans under Ayoub Khan has rendered necessary further military operations in Southern Afghanistan. Prompt measures have been taken by the Government of India for relief of the garrison of Candahar and the conspicuous ability and energy displayed by my officers and troops in the execution of these measures, resulting in a brilliant victory recently gained by the gallant force under the command of Sir Frederick Roberts will, I trust, speedily bring to an honorable termination the war in that division of the country. I regret that it has not hitherto been possible to give you such information on the state of the Indian finance and the recent miscarriages in presenting accounts of military expenditures as you would justly require before entering on a practical consideration of the subject. You may, however, rest assured that I shall redeem my pledge to supply you with this information at the earliest period in my power. No advance has recently been made in the project of a South African Confederation, nor could any advantage arise from endeavors to press it forward, except in proportion to a favorable movement of public opinion in that portion of the Empire. The general state of affairs in South Africa however, is on the whole satisfactory, except in Basutoland, where, I trust, a moderate and conciliatory policy may allay the agitation caused by the enforcement of the disarmament act.

AN insane woman named Mary McCarthy, escaped from the Asylum recently. She created a sensation at Hunter River yesterday morning by threats of incendiarism. Mr. Brown of that place, took her to the city last evening, and requested the police to take her in charge, but they refused to do so. Whereupon Mr. Brown left her in the streets and Mary began speechmaking. She was then taken by the police and lodged in jail.

SEVERAL macadamized streets of the city should receive the attention of our Commissioner. They are thickly strewn with sharp and heavy stones which are very dangerous to horses. Complaints are made regularly of horses spraining their hocks by tramping on these stones. We hope the Commissioner will order their removal before further damage is done.

CANADA TEMPERANCE ACT.—A St. Stephen correspondent of the St. John Telegraph of the 8th inst., says: "Two cases were brought up last week under the Canada Temperance Act. In the first case the defendant closed his shop and left for parts unknown. The second case was a trial for the second offence; but as there was no evidence to show that liquor had been sold, the case was allowed to drop."

UNITED STATES.

CLEVELAND, O., Sept. 7. The Sunday night oyster train on the Baltimore and Ohio railroad ran into a calf near Foster's, and was thrown from the track. The engineer, Wm. Sanderson, was jammed against the fire box and held there until he was roasted to death. The fireman jumped and was injured in such a manner as to render him insane, and he wandered into the woods where he was found. Six cars were demolished.

UPPONVILLE, Sept. 7. On Sunday evening lightning struck the

house of Moses Prewitt, killing Mrs. James Waldon, James Prewitt, and wounding Mrs. Prewitt.

NEW YORK, Sept. 7. A second cargo of Norway ice arrived yesterday.

The obelisk was successfully removed from the hold of the steamer Dessoug yesterday afternoon, and placed on the outer platform in less than an hour.

The Florida Orange crop is reported ruined by the great storm. Loss a million and a half.
