

Soviet Aircraft Intercepted Off Canada's East Coast

OTTAWA - Two pairs of Soviet aircraft were intercepted early on the morning of March 1 when they entered the Canadian Air Defense Identification Zone off Canada's east coast.

According to the North American Aerospace Defense Command (NORAD), the aircraft

were two Soviet Bear "D" and two Soviet Bear "F" aircraft.

The incidents mark the 2nd and 3rd time this year that military aircraft of the Soviet Union have been intercepted, identified and tracked off Canada's shores by Canadian or U.S. fighter inter-

ceptors under operational control of NORAD.

Two F-16 fighter interceptors of the USAF Tactical Air Command's 158th Fighter Interceptor Group of the Vermont Air National Guard, were scrambled from Burlington, Vermont, to intercept the first pair of aircraft.

Two CF-18 fighter interceptors from the 425 Tactical Fighter Squadron

Detachment based at Canadian Forces Base (CFB) Goose Bay, Labrador, were scrambled from CFB Gander, Nfld., to intercept the second pair of Soviet aircraft which were following the original pair.

The Soviet aircraft were detected by radar when they entered the Canadian Air Defense Identification Zone without notification. The intercept mis-

son was controlled by an Airborne Warning and Control Systems (AWACS) aircraft.

The Soviet aircraft, which are used for long-range reconnaissance and anti-submarine warfare, remained over international waters and at no time penetrated Canadian airspace. Their closest approach to land was approximately 370 kilometres (200 nautical miles) from St. John's, Nfld.

and I have the documents here in my files," Maclachlan said.

"If they were doing [harmful research] and they said 'no' on the forms, they would be committing a felony. In the real world, they'd get thrown in jail."

"At least they've introduced the principle of social responsibility, which they never would have admitted a year ago," said Kaler, "but there is no mechanism for review."

"Nobody sees those approval forms," she said. "they are not accessible, so it doesn't make people accountable."

And the policy is not retroactive. Because Knystautas and Lee were engaged in weapons research

at McGill before May, the university cannot take any action against them, and since both DND contracts were signed before the regulations were passed, they are exempt.

Lee and Knystautas are also working on a \$222,142 DND contract McGill's board of governors approved in May 1987 for a "Photographic Study of Mechanisms in Transition." The

research centres on a high-speed camera's photographs of fuel air explosions.

The two professors are also under contract with the Natural Sciences and Energy Research Council, and Energy, Mines, and Resources to study Transition and Transmission of Detonation in Fuel Air Clouds, the Influence of Turbulence on Dust Air Explosions, and Fundamental Problems in Combustion and Explosion.

First produced in 1925, *Hay Fever* ran for 337 performances. It was revived in 1941 and 1963, and again in 1983 at the Queen's Theatre in London. The idea for the play came to Coward after he spent time with a zany American actress and her husband in New York. Considering that this play is regarded as one of the best comedies of modern English theatre, it is surprising to learn that he wrote it in only three days.

The action of the play takes one day, from Saturday afternoon to Sunday morning - a day which the four visitors to the Bliss' house will never forget. The Bliss

family is made up of four eccentrics, living in an age when the rules of behaviour governing a social weekend were clearly spelled out for both the guests and hosts. The four guests, expecting this weekend to be what they are accustomed to, suffer the trauma of having their plans for a quiet weekend thrown into disarray.


Gregson Winkfield is this year's director, a professional director, actor and writer who has directed and acted in England and the United States and across Canada, directed last year's highly successful UPEI production, *The Beaux Strategem*.
