Scout News and Notices

Uniformed Boy Scouts of the 2nd Westmount Troop served as ushers at the sunrise Service held at the "Lookout" in Montreal on Easter Sunday.

COST OF STRIKE
 In Ontario alone there are 133 Scout Group Ladies' Auxiliaries in which some 6,000 mothers of Wolf Cubs and Boy Scouts are enrolled.

The hoped-for 40,000 applications of the Boy Scouts of America at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, next June 30 to July 7, has been exceeded by 7,000, Jamboree officials have announced.

Among 5,000 Boy Scout staves being sent to Greece by Canadian Scouts, will be a unique lot from the Wesley Memorial Troop of Moncton, N. B. Each staff cut and trimmed by a Wesley Troop Scout carries the name of the troop and, carved in Greek, this message: "Good luck for the boys of Greece." Nick Athens, a local restaurateur, supplied the translation.

While on a 2,700-mile flying field trip from Fort McMurray, Alberta, to Tuktoyuktuk in the Northwest Territories, Herbert Northcott, Field Commissioner from Canadian Scout Headquarters, Ottawa, shot a wolf at Fort Resolution. Mr. Northcott visited 28 Wolf Cub Packs and Boy Scout Troops on the trip.

Canada has eight Indian Boy Scout Troops and two Indian Wolf Cub Packs. The Scout Troops are located at Ekasani, N. S., Beauval Indian School, Marieval Indian School and Guy Indian School at Sturgeon Landing, in Saskatchewan; at Aklavik in the Northwest Territories; and at Lytton, Whitehorse and Carcross in British Columbia. The Cub Packs are at Aklavik and at Fort Vermillion, Alberta.

QUEEN'S NEPHEW FINED

PERTH, Scotland, May 1—(AP)—The Earl of Strathmore, 32-year-old nephew of Queen Elizabeth, today was fined £10 (\$31) on a drunken driving charge. His driver's licence was suspended for one year. The Earl, who had pleaded innocent, was arrested last December after a collision between his jeep and another car. Two policemen testified he was so intoxicated they had to support him while taking him to their patrol car. They added his speech was slurred and that he could smell alcohol on his breath.
