An Amicable Solution.

LONDON, Nov. 26. There was a conference of Liberal and Conservative leaders at Gladstone's residence to-day. The Standard says there is good reason to believe that an amicable solution of the redistribution problem is in no means certain.

Paying Members.

BERLIN, Nov. 26. The Reichstag to-day, by a vote of 180 to 99, adopted a resolution in favor of paying members for their services as legislators. The measure was strongly opposed by Bismarck.

Sir Charles Tupper to visit Madrid.

OTTAWA, Nov. 26. It is understood that Sir Charles Tupper visits Madrid at an early date to complete more satisfactory trade relations between Canada and the Spanish West Indies.

Torpedo Defences.

FOO CHOO, Nov. 26. The Chinese Government has notified foreigners that Kin Pai Channel is protected with torpedoes, excepting a passage of 100 feet in width.

The Cholera.

PARIS, Nov. 26. It is estimated that fully 100,000 persons left Paris during the continuance of the cholera epidemic. The people are now returning to their houses in great numbers.

Hydrophobia.

VIENNA, Nov. 26. A veritable epidemic of hydrophobia is prevailing in this city. Already eighty cases have been reported, eleven of which have proved fatal.

Action for Libel.

OTTAWA, Nov. 26. Attorney General Miller, of Winnipeg, is now prosecuting the Daily Sun of that city for libel in re the flogging case.

The Spoils System.

NEW YORK, Nov. 26. Cleveland has declared his intention of refraining from the Spoils system.

OTTAWA, Nov. 26. Mrs. Boutel's sentence has been commuted to imprisonment for life.

The Mahdi's men are deserting. Gordon's position at Khartoum is said to be a safe one.

Belya Lockwood got three votes in Pennsylvania and one in Connecticut. Harvard students object to the rules of the college requiring their attendance at morning prayers.

Advices received from Cairo state that the smallpox at Dongola is spreading among both the English and Egyptians, and threatens to seriously impede Gen. Lord Wolseley's expedition.

The board of inspectors have reported on the condition of the cows in the vicinity of New York. They found pleuro-pneumonia in a contagious form in 2.15 per cent, of some 19,000 cows examined.

The U. S. agricultural commissioner estimates the value of the farm products of the country at \$4,000,000,000. He says the acre under wheat is much beyond the requirements of consumption.

The semi-centennial jubilee of Queen Victoria's ascension to the throne of England occurs in 1887, and court and official circles are already discussing plans for a great national and colonial celebration of the event.

Bishop I. W. Wiley, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, died a day or two ago at Foo Chow. He was on an episcopal tour to the mission in Japan and China, and his death was sudden and unexpected.

A London despatch says the English ship-building work is increasing. At shipyards on the River Tyne, Clyde and the shipyards on the River Tyne, one-fourth of the capacity, there is scarcely one-fourth of the possible working force and power now in effective operation.

BOSTON MARKETS.

Messrs. Hatheway & Co.'s circular of the 22nd inst. says:—

PORK—Mess has further eased off a little, with sales at \$14 and \$14.50 per barrel, Boston clear selling at \$17.50 and \$18.50, and backs at \$18.50 and \$19 per barrel.

LARD.—There has been a moderate demand, with sales at 7 1/2 and 8c. per lb. SMOKED HAMS.—The demand is moderate, with sales at 12 and 13 1/2 cents per lb.

FISH—No movement of importance in P. E. Island Mackerel. Codfish are selling fairly, but at low and unsatisfactory prices.

POTATOES.—Prices are steady on desirable stock, and receipts are kept pretty well sold up. Sales of choice Houlton Rose at 53 and 55 cents. Northern and Western Rose, which constitute the bulk of the supply, are selling at 50 and 53 cents. White stock range a little lower. We quote:—

Rose per bushel, 50 to 53. Burbank Seedlings, 45 to 48. Pearlless, 45 to 48. Beauty of Hebron, 50 to 53. Potatoes, 48 to 50.

EGGS.—There continues to be a quiet market for eggs and prices are irregular. Strictly fresh stock, which are scarce, readily command extreme prices, but most of the receipts are stale and take a wide range. Best Eastern command 28 and 29c per dozen. Canadian and Island sell mostly at 26 and 27c. Fresh Western command 25c. We quote:—Nova Scotia and P. E. Island, 26 and 27c.

OATS.—The demand is light and prices are easy. The sales of No. 1 and extra white have been at 37 and 38c; No 2 white at 34 and 34 1/2c; No 3 white at 33 and 33 1/2c; and mixed at 32 and 34c per bushel.
