VAL D'OR, Que. (CP) — Sixteen planes Tuesday again combed the area in which a photo - survey plane vanished 19 days ago, with four men aboard.
Nine planes took off Tuesday morning, continuing search that has gone on since the Toronto-owned Kenting Aviation Company's Lockheed disappeared without trace July 3. Seven search planes were out in the afternoon.
Only cargo on board the missing plane was some exposed film.
Squad - Ldr. Rene Lemieux, master of the air search, said weather and visibility were good over the search area but no new clues had been found. Every clue turned up previously had petered out.
The plane vanished on a 500-mile flight from Great Whale River on Hudson Bay south to Val d'Or.

Lindsay Will
Hold Centennial

LINDSAY, Nfld. (CP) — A host of memories will be revived by residents of this town when they hold a centennial celebration on the Civic Holiday weekend of Aug. 2-5.
They will recall 1827, when an American dammed the Scogog River at the present site of the locks, to build a grist and sawmill 30 years before the town was incorporated. Shortly after that a village had developed as a lumbering community around the mill.
When the railway arrived from Fort Hope in 1877 the village, with a little more than 1,000 population, had developed rapidly and was incorporated as a town. The community, 18 miles west of Peterborough, now has a population 10 times larger than its original.
NOTE NAMES
Lindsay can boast of an unusually large number of native sons — for a town of its size — who have risen to national prominence in various fields during its 100 years' history.
The list includes men like James Ross, donor of the town's Ross Memorial Hospital; Sir Sam Hughes, the riding MP who in the First World War was minister of militia in the Borden government, and who helped raise the first Canadian contingent.
Premier Leslie Frost of Ontario is one of the town's most popular personalities. Other native sons include scholars such as Dr. Watson Kirkconnell, president of Acadia University in Nova Scotia, and Dr. G. B. Hall, president of the University of Western Ontario at London, Ont.
To the sports world Lindsay has sent Ken Randall, former National Hockey League great; Larry O'Connor, an Olympic hurdler and now a lawyer at Chatham, Ont.; and John Dundas Flavell, dean of Canadian curlers in the 1890s when he was winning international titles. Flavell was also a leading industrialist and businessman.
The achievements of such men as these will be threaded through the various events planned by the town fathers during the centennial weekend.

FIRE FELL MARINES

LAKEHURST, N.J. (AP) — Six U.S. marines were injured fighting a roaring forest fire which threatened a housing development and two factories before it was brought under control early Tuesday. The blaze consumed 1,000 acres of parched scrub pine and hardwood.
