Kremlin Telling Peking To Take Care With War

MOSCOW (AP)—The Kremlin is trying to get a message across to Mao Tse-tung: Be careful about getting into a war with the United States over Southeast Asia, because we might not help you.

The treaty of friendship, alliance and mutual assistance that Stalin and Mao negotiated in 1950 says: If one country is engaged in a stage of war with Japan or states allied with it, the other will immediately render military and other assistance with all the means at its disposal.

There are indications that the Soviet Union has not made up its mind just what it would do if a war developed. It wants to avoid being forced to make up its mind.

Western observers have assumed that allied states meant the United States primarily. The treaty also provides for consultation on all important matters in one article the Kremlin laid the basis for possibly later saying the treaty is invalid by accusing China of failing to consult.

But the Kremlin sees the possibility that the Chinese will force it to spike itself on one of the horns of a dilemma long implicit in Soviet policy. Premier Khrushchev has warned against nuclear war with the United States as a real alternative way to expand Communist control. Khrushchev has been advocating economic competition instead. The Chinese have gone ahead pressing policies that carry the potential of war.

But, Pravda asked, "how do you intend to ensure that in the conditions when a fifty anti-Soviet campaign has been started in China? Isn't there too much risk in this dangerous political game directed toward undermining the very foundations of the Chinese-Soviet friendship?"

So the Kremlin has been issuing warnings to try to restrain China. It has not said publicly that the Soviet Union definitely would leave China on its own to face American military power. What the warnings have said is that this could happen.

The warnings have been conveyed in the rather obscure way that Communists talk to each other through cryptic articles in the press.

438 Man-Made Objects Are Reported In Space

OTTAWA (CP)—North American Air Defence Command reports there now are 438 man-made objects in space and predicts that there may be as many as 10,000 by 1975.

Wednesday marked the third birthday of NORAD's space detection and tracking centre to which the Canadian defence research board's radar laboratory at Prince Albert, Sask., and RCAF space camera at Cold Lake, Alta. contribute information.

The centre was established at NORAD headquarters at Colorado Springs, Colo., July 1, 1961, to keep track of all space objects in case Russia tried to sneak an armed satellite into orbit without anybody else finding out about its presence among the space traffic.

At the time the centre became operational three years ago, there were already 121 objects in space dating from Sputnik I launched by Russia Oct. 4, 1957.

Here is NORAD's present catalogue listing countries, orbiting payloads and space probes in that order:

U.S.	89	5
Russia	9	5
Britain	2	0
Canada	1	0

These figures do not include space objects which have decayed or burned up in the earth's atmosphere.

NORAD says the space population increased approximately 30 per cent in the last year. A total of 159 objects were catalogued during the year; 84 decayed. A total of 77 payloads—satellites, space probes or re-
