Trade With Porto Rico.

WASHINGTON, Jan 23—According to an order just passed trade between ports of the United States and all parts or places in Porto Rico and trade between ports or places in Porto Rico shall be carried on in registered vessels of the United States and no others.

Any merchandise transported in violation of this regulation shall be subject to forfeiture. For every passenger transported and landed in violation of this regulation the transporting vessel shall be subject to a penalty of \$200. This regulation shall not be construed to forbid the sailing of other than registered vessels of the United States with cargo and passengers between the United States and ports or places in Porto Rico, or between ports or places in Porto Rico, provided that none are landed, but are destined for some foreign port or place. This regulation shall not be construed to authorize any lower customs charges or tariff charges on cargoes of American vessels entering from the United States than are paid on the cargoes of foreign vessels entering from foreign ports.

The following tonnage dues are established:—

On entry of a vessel from a port not in Porto Rico or not in the United States 20 cents per ton. On entry of a vessel only to discharge or take on board passengers and their baggage, the tonnage tax is not imposed. Vessels belonging to the United States government or employed in its service or a vessel of a foreign government not engaged in trading, vessels engaged in trade between United States and Porto Rico and vessels engaged in the coasting trade of Porto Rico also are exempt from tonnage dues.

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NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—It is reported that the undertakers of London, England, are "bitterly complaining of the slackness of trade." The gripe, it appears, has not realized expectations.

—A despatch from Ottawa states that the exports for the past six months show a decrease of a million and three-quarters, and that the imports increased 16½ millions. The duty collected increased two millions and a third. But the conditions of trade are not wholesome. We are importing too much, and getting into debt.

—In his inauguration speech Governor Roosevelt gave utterance to a thought that is full of suggestion. He said:

Under no form of government is it so necessary thus to combine efficiency and morality, high principle and rough common sense, justice and the sturdiest physical and moral courage, as in a republic. It is absolutely impossible for a republic long to endure if it becomes either corrupt or cowardly; if its public men, no less than its private men, lose the indispensable virtue of honesty; if its leaders of thought become visionary doctrinaires; or if it shows a lack of courage in dealing with the many grave problems which it must surely face, both at home and abroad, as it strives to work out the destiny meet for a mighty nation.

This is, as Harper's Weekly remarks, absolutely true. The republican Government must be honest, or cease to exist. It must be moral, or invite destruction at the hands of the people whose forefathers established it, and who, in their return and their epoch, maintain and defend it. It must be efficient if it is to be respected, and it must have principle and common-sense—which, by-the-way, is none the better for being rough—for much the same reason that it must have morality.

MR. CHARLTON'S VIEW.

A Not Encouraging Outlook For a Reciprocity Treaty.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 23—A prominent Winnipeg grain merchant has received an interesting letter from Mr. John Charlton, one of the Canadian reciprocity commissioners now in Washington, in which he states he does not know whether they will be able to get a reasonable treaty that will be satisfactory to Manitoba and the North West farmers, but fears they will not be able to meet their desires. The American agricultural schedule the farmers of the United States think, is essential to their well-being, and of course a politician has an eye to votes. Many of the outstanding questions between the two countries can be arranged satisfactorily, and probably something can be done in the line of securing reciprocal trade relations in the products of the field and forest. We are bringing our labors to a close and will know in the course of two or three weeks what can be done and only assure those who are watching our labors here that we shall do all we possibly can and hope to be able to arrange a treaty that will in most respects be fairly satisfactory and will serve as an entering wedge leading up to further concessions and better trade relations in the near future. Mr. Charlton agrees with his correspondent that it was a mistake to allow corn upon the free list until we had negotiated for some concession upon the other side.
