Willis leaves this morning by motor car for Souris, Georgetown and Montserrat, to inspect the corps there.

CHICAGO, June 17—California winner of the Eastern Intercollegiate Meet, carried off team honors in the second National Collegiate Track and Field Meet today by scoring 28 1/2 points. Penn State third with 16 7/10, Illinois fourth with 14 7/10, and Iowa fifth with 11 3/4. Nine records were smashed in the games, which were held together at the greatest field of college stars in a meet this year.

Johnny Merchant, the versatile California star, was the individual star of the meet. He won the shot put and hammer throw and landed fourth in the running broad jump. Merchant also smashed the record for the hammer throw with a heave of 161 feet 4 inches. Leonard Paul, of Grinnell, was second with 10 points, breaking records in both the 160 and 220 yard dashes.
