Provincial Director Civil Defence Speaks At Geo'town

"On Wednesday night, members of the Georgetown and Cardigan Branches of the Canadian Legion met at the Canadian Legion Hall at Georgetown and heard an address by Mr. Peter Pate, Director of Civil Defence for Prince Edward Island. Civil Defence Committees from both Georgetown and Cardigan were appointed, with Mr. J. W. Lavers, President of the Georgetown Branch of the Canadian Legion and Major John A. MacDonald of Cardigan as chairmen of their respective committees.

Mr. Pate was introduced by Legion President, J. W. Lavers, who outlined the object of the meeting. Mr. Pate in his opening remarks, stressed the seriousness of the International situation and said that he had been asked by the Provincial Minister of Civil Defence to make a preliminary survey of the Province. To date Mr. Pate has visited some 80 Island Communities. Committees composed of veterans, as they are the ones who know war and what it means, have been formed throughout the Province.

Mr. Pate said that war was with us now, with thousands of United Nations soldiers dying. An estimated 80,000 evacuees can be provided for in this Province from the industrial areas of Sydney and Halifax.

Army Intelligence estimates that both those areas are within five flying hours from Red territory. The danger of thousands of Communist agents in Canada and the

United States was stressed. Georgetown is considered in the scheme of Civil Defence as a major port of entry of evacuees from the mainland and places of shelter and means of transportation for these evacuees have now been listed and will be in readiness should an emergency arise. Wilfred Arsenault, Provincial Minister of Civil Defence.
