



DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

The latest addition to the Earle Semple stable at the Charlotte-town track is the 9-year-old trotter, Sir Chuck 2:13 4/5. He is a big gelding by Calumet Ebis and is eligible to the 2:22 class. The last couple of years he has been campaigned in amateur events and occasionally for purses. His best time in a winning race last season was 2:15 over a slow track. He should furnish good competition for our locally owned trotters. Sir Chuck is owned by Brainerd Steele, Bangor, Maine.

The money expended in improving Truro Raceway and making it into a faster oval has paid off and this season's attendance is far in excess of other years. There was a noticeably large crowd on hand last Saturday night and they saw another good battle between Don Turner's Tonyville and the recent import Judge Miller. In Race 4 with these two and also Texas Hanover, Future Counsel and Headway an accident occurred and Jimmie Given, driver of Headway, was thrown to the track and Headway finished driverless. Tonyville (D. Turner) finished 1st, Judge Miller (MacLeod) 2, Texas Hanover (Barrieau) 3. Future Counsel (Conroy) 4. Time, 2:13 3/5. In Race 7 with the same field Judge Miller was 1, Headway 2, Texas Hanover 3. Time, 2:10 2/5.

Frank Daniels was the only double winner of the night, being first in Race 1 with Sport Volo, Pepper Boy (G. Turner) 2, time, 2:19. The owner is P. Harvey Windsor. He was also first in Race 8 with Follow Up Jr., Leo Federal (Conroy) 2, time, 2:14 3/5. H. F. MacGregor was the winning owner. Other winners were: Race 3, Freddie Scott, owned by L. C. Dwyer, Moncton, and driven by Harley Harrison, won Race 6 with Freddie Scott 2, time 2:15 2/5. Race 2 was won by Junior Hal, owned by E. Whalen, Amherst, and driven by C. MacLeod, Pepper Shaker (Gould) 2, time, 2:4 4/5. The daily double payoff was one to \$165.80. Sport Volo and Junior Hal were coupled in this and Sport Volo paid \$23.40 for a \$200 ticket.

One of the big nights at Maywood Park, Chicago, is Greyhound Night, when the champion trotter is exhibited to admiring thousands from Chicago and in fact from all over the state of Illinois. Probably no harness horse since Dan Patch has received so much acclaim as this magnificent specimen of the equine race. In 1933 he trotted a world record of 1:55 1/4 trotting and it has never been approached and many believe that no horse will ever equal it. His trainer and driver was the famous Sep Palin, who died a few years ago after placing his name on the world's champion harness horse records in many places.

Greyhound is now 22 years old and lives in horse luxury in a private apartment in the Flanery Stables west of Chicago. As he looks out his stall door he sees some of the most beautiful scenery in the state. His quarters are luxurious, wood-paneled and divided into two parts. On one side people stand and look at Greyhound and on the other side Greyhound stands and looks at the people. His side is air conditioned. E. J. Baker, now 85 years old, whose colors were so prominent years ago on race tracks, lives in St. Charles, Ill., and bought Greyhound as a yearling in 1933, paying \$900 for him.

In the next eight years Greyhound took part in 78 heats. He won 71, was second in five, third once and fourth once. In races or assaults against time he beat the 200 mile 22 times and he holds 15 world's records. He is fed twice daily and every morning is taken out for a run in the year near the stable. Colonel E. J. Baker goes out to visit him regularly and horse breeders from all over the world when they visit Chicago, make it a point also to visit Greyhound. Once or twice a year for several years he has come out of retirement to show best likeness.

We don't know how we missed it but anyhow we are very glad to inform our readers that Watchin' Go, a 5-year-old son of Watchin' 2:06, at present in George A. Callbeck's stable at Summerside, won at Vernon Downs recently in 2:07 2/5. The purse was \$1,350. Other Watchin's are performing quite well in Maine and other places. He was a horse that had small opportunity but made the best of it. Another son of Watchin', Frank Adams, was a winner at Gorham, Maine, recently and paid his backers handsomely. The same night Mr. McGee by Abner T. Clegg 2:04 1/2 won in 2:09 2/5.

The dates of the 16th annual auction of the Standardbred Horse Sales Company have been announced as Nov. 8-13 inclusive, at Harrisburg, Pa. Last year's sales totalled over \$1 million and the first 2:00 performer of 1954, Bonnie Brook Dean came from that sale, also a great many other trotters and pacers that have made or are making good this season.

One of the most popular wins at Roosevelt Raceway recently was Piney Fingo, a 4-year-old by Calumet Fingo 2:04, won the A Pace in 2:04 2/5. He has earned \$10,425 this season for a total of \$34,075. Calumet Fingo was practically overlooked while in stud service in the Maritimes but in a few years in new surroundings with good brood mares available he has shown himself as a stallion to be taken note of. Race horses by him possess gameness and wearing qualities and their names pop up very frequently at Roosevelt Raceway and other tracks.

Recent winners at Roosevelt include a 2-year-old trot by Home Free, driven by Joe O'Brien; a BB Trot, pure \$3,500, won by Hadley Hanover, driven by Del McTavish in 2:13 2/5 for one and one-sixteenth miles. The same night McTavish was second in the BB Pace with Gay Abbe in 2:04 3/5. Joe O'Brien won the BB Pace, pure \$3,500 with the 3-year-old Diamond Hal by Hal Dale in 2:05 1/5 and McTavish won the CC Pace, pure \$2,000 with Vivian Counsel, time, 2:07 1/5. The B Pace, pure \$2,500, was won by the 6-year-old Doctor J. A. by Simcoe Harvester, driven by McTavish, time, 2:05 4/5—a new record for Doctor J. A. His previous record was 2:07 made last season. He was formerly owned by that good sportsman, Dr. J. A. Donahoe, Truro, who will no doubt be greatly pleased that he has taken such a fast mark.

Another winner for Joe O'Brien was Dazzle Mite, a 3-year-old that won the CC Pace, pure \$2,000, in 2:07 2/5; and now we note a very popular win that we intended including last week—the CC Pace, pure \$2,000 with Prince Maplecroft, owned by R. J. Logue of Sydney, and driven by Sanders Russell, time, 2:06 4/5—a new record for Prince Maplecroft, his previous record being 2:07 2/5.



LITTLE SPORT



A large delegation of golfers from the Charlottetown Golf Club will be in Fredericton next week to compete in the annual N.B.-P.E.I. Amateur and Open Golf Tournament. Heading the delegation will be the defending champion Art MacKenzie. Golf pro Cecil Dowling accompanied by Had McInnis and Irving Fraught left yesterday for the New Brunswick capital and the other City golfers will leave this morning.

Among those taking part will be Bob Gray, Doug Saunders, Don MacDonald, Tom Rogers, Allan MacMillan, Wendell Gillis, Jack Brown, Don MacMillan, Allan MacRae, Abe Douglas, Harry Simons, Errol Nicholson and Bill MacGregory. Simmonds and Nicholson will compete in the junior playdowns while the others will play in the championship flight, first or second divisions.

Club-mates Art MacKenzie and Bob Gray met in the finals of the N.B.-P.E.I. tournament which was held at the Belvedere Golf Course last year. They were tied after 72 holes of play with identical scores of 298 and MacKenzie won the championship on the 73rd hole with a birdie three. Both players won a berth on the N.B.-P.E.I. Willingdon Cup team. This year there are three openings on the two-province team. Maurice Dowling clinched one berth last weekend by winning a tournament sponsored by the N.B.-P.E.I. Golf Association.

Sunday, July 11, should be recorded as one of the most memorable baseball days that Memorial Field has seen. Don MacLeod pitched a seven-inning no-hitter while Buck Whitlock hit two home runs in the second game. MacLeod's no-hitter was the first at Memorial Field in two years while Whitlock's feat of hitting two homers in a single contest was the first of its kind for several seasons.

Whitlock must have set some sort of a batting record last week. In the two games he went to the plate six times and connected for six hits including three home runs. That, including his forearm power which enable him to score so many goals also enable him to snap that willow at the plate. Buck probably possesses as much natural athletic ability as any person who ever took part in athletics on the Island. Certainly he has had a marvelous career and he doesn't show any signs of slowing down.

While many of Whitlock's greatest accomplishments on the ice and baseball diamond are behind him the reverse is probably true of Don MacLeod. "Duck" looks like the best all-around ball player in the City. He is an exceptionally good pitcher, a fine short stop and a solid hitter. He has plenty of physical and mental ability and he always keeps coming up with that important play. He has been playing short stop in all City League games. His no-hit effort last Sunday was his first pitching performance of the year.

Baker Sold To Phillies

Manager Fined

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP)—Lakeland manager Rip Sewell was fined \$50 Friday and suspended indefinitely by John Kridler, Florida State League president who turned the case over to President George Trautman of the National Baseball Association.

It was one of the most stringent reprimands in the history of the 15-year-old Class D league. Kridler also fined outfielder Les Witherspoon \$50, third baseman Rene Friol and pitcher Dick Donnelly \$25 each.

The action culminated an investigation into Lakeland's forfeit loss to Orlando Wednesday night when umpires John Maloney and Audine Batts called the game in the last of the eighth as the pilots swarmed off the field to argue when Bob Wilson was ruled safe on a thirdbase steal.

Kridler termed the entire incident one "of the worst exhibitions of vile and profane attack on umpires in the history of the Florida State League. In baseball we treat such demonstrations the same way we would a physical attack on the umpires."
