German Iron Masters are excited and indignant at the increase of Russian duties on iron.

The Empress Eugenie arrived on the 28th May near the spot where the Prince Imperial was killed.

The anniversary of the birth of Daniel O'Connell will be celebrated in Toronto on the sixth of August next, by a grand demonstration under the auspices of the Emerald Benevolent Association.

A young man named Wm. Hay had both legs pulled from his body, yesterday, in his father's mill, at Millville, York Co., N. B. He was oiling the machinery at the time, and was caught in the belt and carried to the shafting.

The remains of a young woman named Kate Foster, formerly belonging to St. John, arrived there from Boston on Tuesday. She had poisoned herself on account of having been deserted by a man with whom she was keeping company.

Patrick Donnelly has paid all the debts of his father, and has the design of a unique monument to be erected over the victims of the Biddulph tragedy. The monument will have five sides, bearing an inscription relative to each one of the five victims, and the top will be surmounted with the statue of a youth handcuffed in memory of Tom.

A most peculiar circumstance happened at the Coal Harbor Dyke during the recent thunder storm. A diver was at work, and the lightning got into the air pump, and was forced down to the man in the water; the men in the boat noticed something wrong, had the driver brought to the surface, when he was found to be completely exhausted.

A man named Michaud, living about Grand Falls, built a railroad car. It consisted of four wheels, two large and two small, round which went a square linked chain. The car is moved by a crank, and goes at incredible speed. Michaud lives at St. Basil and works at St. Leonard. In the morning he goes to work on his car, in the evening he rides home on it. A few evenings ago, just at dusk, the section men saw what they thought a phantom flit along the road. They pursued and captured it. It was Michaud and his car. They sent it to Gibson and it is there now a marvel of untalented ingenuity.—*Fredericton Star.*

The Government of the United States has determined on a step which will render important aid to the cause of Arctic exploration. This is the establishment of a colony of explorers, consisting of fifty select men, under the leadership of Captain Chester, who has already won a reputation in that branch of science, having taken part in the famous Polaris expedition. The colony will be permanently stationed as near as it is possible to maintain life usefully to the North Pole. As our readers are aware, the British Government has signified its desire that Canada should engage in a similar enterprise, for which its vast range of circumpolar territory is naturally thought to offer peculiar facilities. No doubt, we shall soon hear of the Government having authorized the organization and equipment of the necessary force. But we suppose it will first be requisite to fix upon the locality where the expedition will have its headquarters.

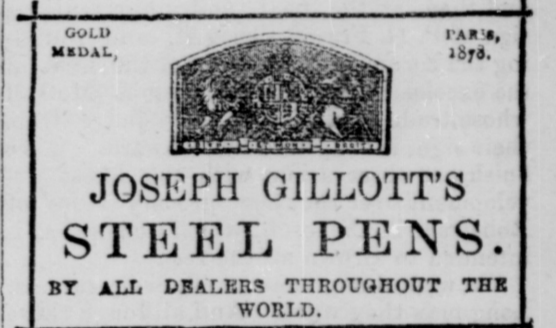
