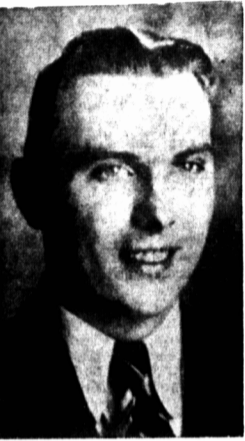

## Increase Expected In Vehicle Registration

That approximately 5,000 automobiles and 2,000 trucks have yet to be registered for the current year is the conclusion to be drawn from statistics released yesterday by J.A. Gallant, Registrar of Motor Vehicles. The estimate is based on the assumption that this year's total registration will equal that of last year, which it is expected to do. "If registration follows the general trend of the last seven years, I would expect increased registration this year," Mr. Gallant said. ABOUT 15,500 REGISTERED Although exact figures are not yet available, Mr. Gallant estimated that some 9,000 autos are now registered, 6,000 of them at the Charlottetown office. The estimate for trucks if about 4,500, 2,800 of which total have registered at Charlottetown. Total registration last year was 14,163 automobiles and 6,457 trucks. EXTRA STAFF Extra staff has been engaged for the rush period, Mr. Gallant stated, adding that "Tuesday was the biggest day, workwise, that we ever had here, with 1,001 items being handled." Mr. Gallant recently returned from Quebec City where he attended the Canadian Highway Safety Conference.

## Naval Units And Veterans Will Parade On Sunday

A church parade and memorial services will feature the observance of Battle of Atlantic Sunday in Charlottetown on May 5. The parade will be made up of members of the active R.C. Reserve and R.C.N. personnel stationed at H.M.C.S. Queen Charlotte, along with the local Sea Cadet Corps and members of the Charlottetown branches of the Naval Officers Association of Canada and the Main Branch Association. PARADE ROUTE Under the command of Commander J.N. Kenny, C.D., Commanding Officer, Queen Charlotte, with Lieut. Commander W.N. Black as second in command, the parade will form up in King's Square at 9 a.m. Sunday morning. The parade will move off at about 10:30, headed by the P.E.I. Regt. (17 Recce) Band, and will consist of two detachments, the Roman Catholic Church Party and the Protestant Church Party. The R.C. Party will be commanded by Lieut-Commander (SB) A.J. Macadam will attend 11:00 o'clock Mass at St. Dunstan's Basilica, and the Protestant Party under Lieut. K.A. MacKenzie, will attend service at St. Paul's Anglican Church. The route to the churches will be along Kent to Queen Street, to Grafton, to Prince. On the march along Grafton streets will be paid when passing the War Memorial. At Church Street the Protestant Party will turn off and proceed to St. Paul's. The R.C. Party will continue down Prince to Richmond to Great George to the Basilica. MARCH PAST After services the parade will reform on Hillsboro Square in preparation for the March - past which takes place in front of the Provincial Building. The salute will be taken by His Honor, Lieut. Governor T.W.L. Prowse. On the return march the parade will be under the command of instructor Commander Clarence Mercer, with Commander Kenny being on the reviewing stand with Lieut. Governor Prowse. Passing the saluting base the route of march will be to Queen to Kent returning to King's Square for dismissal. During the march-past the Sea Cadets will be under the command of Lieut. Jack Smallwood and the N.A.O.C. will be headed by president Lieut. Cdr. Wilfred Duffy, R.C.N. (R) retired while president George Barts will command the Main Branch Association.

## Local Blood Clinics Finish With Total Attendance 1,175

Stormy weather and all, 220 "Life Savers" reported at yesterday's concluding sessions of the Spring Red Cross Blood Donor Clinics. This brought the grand total for the week to 1,175 registered for the four days. While this is considerably below the target set of 1,500, it was the largest attendance there has ever been at Charlottetown Clinics. The Charlottetown Red Cross Blood Donor Committee members were quite pleased to find that about 82 per cent of the donors reporting were attending for the first time, commented that this speaks well for the efforts to secure membership in the "Life Saver Club" made by the different organizations. Results of the competition for the Trophy put up by the Labor Council, and for the competition between St. Dunstan's and Prince of Wales, will be announced later when these groups have an opportunity to check their attendance records. Those assisting at the Clinics yesterday were Ladies' Auxiliary of Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion, Royal Edward Chapter, I.O.D.E., Red Cross High School Members from Rochford Square School, Red Cross Corps and Staff and the Nurses' Association. ## U. S. Calls Ambassador Home From Middle East

By WARREN ROGERS JR. WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower Thursday gave up on Egypt, Syria and Jordan as participants at this time in his military-economic plan for combatting Middle East communism. The president called home his special ambassador, James P. Richards, choosing not to have him mark time waiting for invitations to visit these three Arab countries. The invitations seemed unlikely to be forthcoming. All three nations had made clear they took a dim view of the Eisenhower resolution and its 200,000,000 ready dollars. Each, in its own way, had head-shouldered Richards. HEAD FOR BONN It was to get him out of this embarrassing situation that the state department last week announced Richards would go to Bonn, West Germany, to confer with state secretary Dulles. Dulles went to Bonn Tuesday for a North Atlantic Treaty meeting. The state department said last week that Dulles and Richards would meet to plan the rest of Richards' itinerary through the Middle East to explain the Eisenhower plan. But Eisenhower decided Wednesday to cancel that meeting. Instead, he directed Richards to return to Washington. For the record, it was explained that Richards is coming here to help prepare the new foreign aid bill. Officials made little effort, however, to hide a more practical reason. This was that, after touring 12 countries in six weeks and with three more on his schedule, Richards simply was not welcome in Egypt, Syria and Jordan. GO TO ISRAEL The state department said that, after going from Greece to Israel Thursday, Richards will visit Tunisia on Saturday and Morocco on Monday, returning to Washington next Wednesday. On Thursday he is scheduled to attend a meeting of congressional leaders on foreign aid at the White House. Richards' decision to go to Israel caused more than one set of eyebrows to be raised. The Eisenhower administration has been jealously guarding the Arab good-will it won by its opposition last October to the British-French-Israeli attack on Egypt.

## Presbyterian Moderator To Visit Here May 8-9

Rev. Dr. Finlay G. Stewart, Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, will visit Prince Edward Island centres on May 8th and 9th during the course of a Maritime tour in connection with Presbyterian rallies. Rallies will be held on Wednesday, May 8th, at Tyne Valley in the afternoon and Summerside in the evening and on Thursday, May 9th, at Montague in the afternoon and Charlottetown in the evening. The Westminster Choir of Toronto, consisting of twenty-six young women training for Church work, will accompany the Moderator. Rev. Dr. Stewart, a graduate of Knox College, has been minister of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Kitchener, Ont., for more than nineteen years, during which time its membership has increased to 1,800, making it the largest Presbyterian Church in Canada. In 1955, Rev. Dr. Stewart had the degree of Doctor of Divinity conferred upon him by his Alma Mater, Knox College, HIGHLY TALENTED Apart from his theological pursuits, Rev. Dr. Stewart has participated in a varied number of vocations, and is well known throughout Canada and the United States for his abilities as a convention and conference speaker. In athletics, he is the holder of the first letter from the University of Toronto, having won two college titles on the track and field team. As a school teacher, he taught in Ottawa, and is a past chairman of the Board of Secondary Education in the cities of Kitchener and Waterloo. With His Majesty's Services, he served five years and was decorated in 1945 for his services in Northwestern Europe. He is a chaplain of both the reserve army and the Canadian Legion. Fraternally, Rev. Dr. Stewart is a member of both the Masonic and Orange Lodges, and the I.O.O.F. He is married and has four children, who join with one thousand other youngsters in attending St. Andrew's Church Sunday School.
