THE PATRIOTIC FUND CONCERT.—A second Concert, in aid of the above Fund, was given at the Temperance Hall on Thursday evening last. Never did the spacious room in which it took place present a more beautiful appearance than on that occasion, brilliantly illuminated as it was with gas. The walls on both sides were tastefully decorated with flags, suspended to long poles, terminating in a spear, crowned with wreaths of artificial flowers. Over the Orchestra hung the national flag of Turkey—the Crescent—with the inscription in gilt cut letters—"Abdul Medjid." At the head of the room, above the platform, the national flags of England and France were gracefully intertwined—a full length portrait of Prince Albert, painted by Mr. Murphy of this city, being in the centre;—on the right side the inscription in gilt cut letters, suspended from a line: "Victoria Regina;" on the left, in similar letters: "Napoleon III.," and over all these was the inscription: "Success to the Allies," done in a similar manner. The walls were also hung with many splendid pictures and engravings, and the Royal Arms was placed over the seat occupied by His Excellency the Lieut. Governor and family. The Band, which numbered thirteen instruments, brass and stringed, was under the management of Mr. G. P. Tanton, who displayed great taste and talent in the selection as well as in the performance of the pieces chosen. The vocal part of the music was conducted by the Misses Duchemin, under the direction of Mr. Watson Duchemin, with the accompaniment of an Harmonicon, and a splendid new Organ built by that ingenious and talented mechanic. The singing was rapturously applauded, and many songs were encored—a proof that the talents displayed by the young ladies was of no ordinary character. The Organ was much admired for the richness and volume of its tones. In short, everything in connection with this Concert was done admirably, and we are sure that when the crowded audience left the Hall at a late hour that evening, it was with regret that the entertainment terminated so soon. Let us hope that this is not the last of the Concerts. We have all done our part in aid of the widows and orphans of the soldiers abroad; why may we not try to do something by means of another Concert in aid of the poor of our own little country?

SOME OF THE FIRST FRUITS OF THE RECIPROcity TREATY.—Although it can yet hardly be said that the Trade of the Island has resumed its wonted activity after the long winter, we nevertheless perceive a great improvement from the operation of the Reciprocity Treaty, passed into a law last Session. The following statement furnished to us by the Controller of Customs at this port shows that a greater amount of produce has been shipped from Charlottetown alone than was ever known to leave the port at any other season. Cleared at the Custom House, Charlottetown, between the 18th day of April and the 5th day of May, 1855:— 53,736 bushels Oats; 30,580 bushels Potatoes; 1775 bushels Pork; 1600 bushels Turnips; 50 tons Oatmeal; 95 barrels Barley; 57 bags Pearled Barley; 34 kegs Lard; 20 bags Hayseed; 114 barrels Flour.

No one would have supposed that so much produce could find its way into so small a place as this; but if the exportation from Charlottetown is so great, what will that of the whole Island be? We should like to see the returns from the Out-ports, and trust our friends will furnish them. The great demand for our produce and the high prices it commands, are the immediate results of the establishment of free trade with the United States. To the liberal party belongs the credit of that measure. Its advocacy commenced with the leader of the Government so far back as 1849. He was ridiculed and abused for proposing such a thing. From 1851 to 1854 it was advocated under the Liberal Government by Sir Alexander Bannerman in his able de-patches to the Colonial Office; and in the Fall of that year the second Liberal House of Assembly, under the administration of our present popular Governor, passed the measure into law. Perhaps there is no Act upon the Statute Book which will be so conducive to the general prosperity as that very one will be; and it will, as it deserves, constitute a strong claim, on the part of the present Government, to the confidence and gratitude of the country.

THE PACKET SERVICE.—The Steamer Rosebud made two trips between Charlottetown and Pictou during the past week, with mails and passengers, and in making these trips has been tolerably regular as to time. We trust she will continue so, for nothing is more important to a community than regularity in the carrying of the Mails; but we fear the Rosebud has scarcely the power sufficient for the service in which she is engaged. We will be glad, however, if she proves otherwise. The amount which we understand, she is to receive from the Government is £700. The Lady Le Marchant has likewise been engaged, at the same cost, to run between Charlottetown, Bedouque and Shediac. We hope better arrangements will be made with the proprietor of that boat than those under which he had the contract last year, for the boat, though a good one, was notoriously dilatory and behind time in the performance of her trips.

RECRUITING.—A Lieutenant and a Sergeant of the 76th Regt. have arrived here from Halifax, to beat up recruits for Her Majesty's Foreign Legion. We shall know, by the result of their proceedings, what amount of martial enthusiasm there is in P. E. Island, and how many ardent spirits there are amongst us who are ready to share the glories and the dangers of their fellow subjects in the Crimea.

"THE ODICUM OR VOCALIST'S GUIDE," is a little work on Vocal Music, compiled and printed by Mr. J. Ross, Teacher of Music. It evinces an intimate acquaintance with his art, while the introduction gives much interesting information on the history of Music; and the letter press is highly creditable.

MECHANICS' INSTITUTE.—T. Heath Haviland, Esq., delivered on Tuesday evening his promised lecture on "Magna Charta." He entered into the peculiar characteristics of the history of the 18th century, and showed the state of England at that era. He then gave the leading features of the great charter of the liberties of Britain, showed how it was obtained, and stated that it formed the grand foundation of our laws and privileges. That although it conferred certain immunities upon the Barons, yet that it merited the title it bears, because it protected every individual of the nation, bond as

well as free, in the full enjoyment of his life, his liberty and property, unless declared to be forfeited by the law of the land.

A protracted and spirited discussion followed, promoted by Benjamin Davies, Esq., and others, and was well sustained until a late hour.

His Honor the President will, to-morrow evening, deliver a lecture upon "the Occult Sciences," and will conclude the present session, by giving a brief review of the past proceedings of the Institute, and by pointing out the future course of progression.

THE SHIP JAMES CHESTON.—In the London Shipping Gazette of March 29th, we find a letter of Captain Wilson, of the British Bark Marathon, by which the ship James Cheston was picked up after being abandoned, in which he gives the following account of the condition in which the ship was found:—

"All the hatches were off and everything in disorder on deck, still's papers, compasses, and wearing apparel being taken away. I immediately went into the hold, and found about three feet of water on the between decks, and also perceived water rushing in around and through two holes in the cargo port. To all appearance, attempts had been made to force out the port out—the lashing being cut, and the port nearly cut through; there were also two auger holes through it, and the water was running in with great force."
