Recognizing the Odorous.

tion, in the *Journal of Science*, says:

How the Editor Shot Him!

My pistol was lying on my desk, and
I had intended to place it in my pocket
on changing my coat and leaving the
office. Suddenly the door opened and
two men entered, closing the door be-
hind them. I recognized Colonel Slay-
back and Mr. Clopton, a lawyer who had
a few days before assailed two members
of his profession in a private office. I re-
alized that I was to be assaulted, and
arose from my chair. Colonel Slay-
back's bearing was that of a man bent
upon violence. His first words were,
"Well, I am here." He started as if to
draw off his coat. Instinctively, I moved
my hand towards the weapon on the
desk. He saw it, suddenly readjusted
his coat and said: "Is that for me?" at
the same time throwing his hand to his
hip pocket. My reply was, "No, sir, it
is not." I secured my weapon as he drew
his. This is the story of the St. Louis
editor, who killed a noted Missouri poli-
tician on Friday afternoon. It is an un-
varnished tale, and conveys its own
moral, as the New York *Graphic* points
out. St. Louis is the sixth city in the
Union in point of population, and is ex-
ceeded in size by only about a dozen
cities in Europe, yet every man go-
ing armed to his business as if he belonged
to an army of occupation in an enemy's
country. Had these men not been armed
nothing more serious than a blacked
eye would have resulted from their en-
counter, even if that much for men of
education, as both of them were, rarely
consider a fistie encounter consistent
with the dignity of a gentleman.

They of a Folding Boat

It has been believed by many that the
remarkable collapsible boats invented by
R. E. L. Berthon, and now known as the
general use in England, though good for
some purposes, could never stand the
test of a gale of wind or compete with
other boats in sailing powers. To prove
the fallacy of this opinion, Captain
Frederick Harvey, R. N., and Captain
Whitely Nicholson, ventured to take a
trip in a 28 foot boat of this kind, on
the 19th of August, they embarked in
the S. S. Esquibel, by the permission
of the Royal Mail Company, on the 14th
August. On the 4th the boat and crew
were put overboard about 400
miles west of the Scilly Isles. There
was a strong wind and high sea. The
boat was blown about 100 miles
and when they reached their wharves
about 60 miles west of the Cape
Finisterre, they then bore away
more to the north, and reached the
Scilly Isles on the 19th at 3 a. m. Here
they stayed till Sunday, the 20th at 4
p. m., when in more than half a gale of
wind they started again for Southampton,
and made the wonderful run of 240 miles
to the Needles in thirty-five hours. The
Engineer believes this is quite unpre-
cedented for a ship's boat. The courage
and skill of Captain Harvey and his
able conductor, Captain Nicholson, an
officer of the army, were admirably dis-
played in starting again from Truro,
encountering such a gale of wind as
they had in skirting the Bay of
Biscay from south to north. The
total distance run on this occasion
could not have been much less than 800
miles, and when it is considered that the
whole time she bore the brunt of the gale
which raged here in the beginning of last
week, we have abundant proof that the
Berthon boats are not exceeded in sea-
worthiness and speed by any others in
the world. The boat is now afloat in the
inner dock at Southampton, and has not
suffered in the smallest degree. She
has been visited by a great many mem-
bers of the British Association. The
dimensions of the boat are as follows:—
Length, 28 ft. 4 in.; breadth, 8 ft. 6 in.;
depth, 8 ft. 9 in. When run against the
bulwarks of a ship her width is 22 in.
with all her gear stowed in her, such as
masts, sails, oars, water breakers, and
anchors. The time required to open, set
up, and lower such a boat is less than
one minute. It was done before 160
members of the British Association in
forty-five seconds.
