Dr. Jameson, whose raiding expedition was snuffed out so promptly by Oom Paul Kruger, has taken charge of the construction of a transcontinental telegraph line in Africa.

Secretary of the Navy John D. Long was recently made a member of the famous Harvard Custard Pie association. Secretary Long produced the largest pie, which was 20 inches in diameter.

Major William J. Davis, secretary of the Louisville school board, has sold his collection of fossils to the University of California for \$15,000. Major Davis sacrificed the magnificent collection to pay his debts.

Bernard Bettman of Cincinnati has accepted the presidency of the cagerfest jubilee which is to commence the fiftieth anniversary of the North American Sangerbund and is to be held in Cincinnati in 1899.

Lawrence Washington of Alexandria, Va., has been appointed an assistant in the Congressional library at Washington. He is to be in charge of the George Washington department. Mr. Washington is a great-grandnephew of the first president.

Ex-Governor Hogg is said to be one of the most popular speakers in Texas. His facial expression is remarkable and when he makes a good point he stops short and surveys his audience with a look so comical that his most bitter opponent is forced to laugh.

It is related of Nicola Tesla, who has been even more talked about than usual of late, that he is so absentminded that he once got into his bath without undressing, got out and went through the motion of drying himself, donned a complete set of clothing and went about his business doubly clad.

Davy Stephens, who for 50 years has sold papers on the pier at Kingstown, Ireland, has a fame that is almost worldwide. He has seen every person of importance who has visited Ireland during the last half century, has been patronized by most of them and with many, including royalty, has formed acquaintance.

John Miller of Berkeley county, W. Va., has sold his apple crop for a little more than \$20,000. This is the product of 34 acres of mountain land, the assessed value of which is less than \$3 per acre. As a side issue Mr. Miller realized between \$3,000 and \$4,000 from his peach crop. His father, from a much smaller apple orchard, realized between \$8,000 and \$10,000.

FRUIT HINTS.

Shiftless fruit culture cuts down the profits. It is always a good plan to mulch newly set trees.

A dressing of coarse manure makes a good mulch.

Pack apples so that they will not shake about in the barrel.

Keep down the weeds and suckers among the raspberry plants.

No farm home is complete without a good orchard and small fruit plot.

The orchard should not be cultivated at this season, nor should manure be applied until after the leaves have fallen.

Feeble growing and unhealthy trees are usually the result of starvation, bad soil or unfavorable conditions of growth.

It is not too late to examine the peach trees for borers. If found, dig them out with a sharp knife and destroy them.

When a tree is healthy, the top is luxuriant, but when it is weak or old the top dies or makes little growth, and small shoots sprout all over the trunk.

It is impossible for fruit to be perfect and well colored unless the tree—body, branches and leaves—as well as the ground under it, is fully exposed to sunlight.

When the orchard is seeded to clover one of the best plans of management is either to mow the growth and let it lie as a mulch or let it die down as it was in the fall.—St. Louis Republic.
