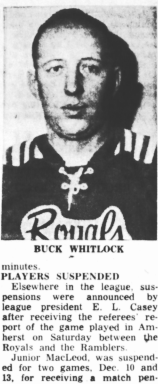

Would Take An NHL Club To Defeat Russian Team

MONTREAL (CP)—Sam Pollock, assistant farm system director for the Montreal Canadiens, said Monday it would take an NHL club to defeat the Russian team that recently toured Canada in series played under international rules.

"With international rules, I don't believe there is any club in Canada that can beat the Russians," said Pollock, who is general manager of Ottawa-Hull Junior Canadiens, downed twice by the touring Moscow Selects.

"The rules are a tremendous handicap and nothing less than an NHL club can beat the Russians under these circumstances. It's unbelievable how different rules and interpretation can affect a team."

The Moscow Selects won five out of seven games and tied one of their recent eight-game tour, playing against the junior Canadian and clubs in the Ontario Hockey Association Senior A division.

Pollock said Whitby Dunlops, who defeated the Selects 7-3 will have a tough time in the world hockey championships in Oslo in February.

"If the Dunlops were to play 70 or 80 games they are going to get themselves. With only the eight or 10 games they are going to play over there, they can never do it."

The Selects beat Ottawa-Hull 8-3 in their first encounter and then trounced the junior team 10-1 in the second time.

"We've never taken a beating like that," said Pollock.

Ankle Injury Could End Layne's Playing Days

DETROIT (AP)—Bobby Layne, whose 10-year professional career has been threatened time and time again by a series of injuries, had another one to contend with Monday.

The veteran Detroit Lions quarterback said he would not make an immediate decision on whether a broken ankle sustains his playing days.

In Sunday's Cleveland Browns game would end his playing days. This is the most serious injury Layne has suffered by the former Texas great, who often has played publicly that he would keep playing "as long as I can avoid serious injury."

It was the recuperation, rather than the seriousness of the broken right ankle, that bothered Layne as he rested comfortably in his hospital bed.

"If it heals all right and I can go at full steam, then I see no reason why I should retire," he said. "Other than the injury, I don't think I'm so old that I can't play for a little longer. I felt fine all season until this happened."

Layne, who came to the Lions in 1949 after his rookie season with the old New York Bulldogs, will be 31 in 10 days.

HAD HEAD INJURY
At about this same time a year ago Layne suffered a head injury in the season's final game against the Chicago Bears. There was scattered speculation that Layne would step out then, but his mother contracted for about \$20,000 and it carries through the 1958 season.

Over the past four or five seasons Layne has been troubled off and on by a recurrent shoulder injury that has not bothered him to any extent since the 1955 campaign.

Layne was injured late in the second period of Sunday's game, when the Lions went to win 20-7 to remain in the Western Conference championship chase. His mud cleats caught in the turf as he was being tackled by the Browns' Quinlan and Paul Wig.

Newcomer Inks New Contract

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Don Newcombe has signed a two-year contract to pitch for the Los Angeles Dodgers next year at a salary estimated at \$100,000.

E. J. (Buzzy) Bavasi, assistant general manager telephoned Dodger headquarters from New York to say he had signed the big right-hander, who last season won 11 games and lost 12 but led both major leagues in control, issuing 1149 strikes in 129 innings.

Bavasi said Newcombe was taking a "token cut" in signing for 1958 year in comparison to last year. Newcombe was the most valuable player in 1956, when he won 27 and lost 7.

Newcombe was the sixth Dodger to sign, the other four being team captain Pee Wee Reese, Duke Snider, Roy Campanella, and Gus Givens.

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Doug Mohns Breaks Jaw

BOSTON (AP)—Boston Bruins reported Monday night that Doug (Diesel) Mohns suffered a double fracture of the left jaw in a Chicago Sunday night when struck from behind by Ian Cushman, spare defense player of the Chicago Black Hawks.

The National Hockey League club reported the jaw was set and wired Monday in Chicago.

Dr. Myron J. Tremaine, Black Hawk club doctor, told the Bruins by phone that Mohns would be discharged probably Wednesday but will not be able to play for about six weeks.

Mohns suffered the injury in the third period of Sunday's game which the Bruins won 3-0.

Cushman was playing only because Elmer Vasko was injured.

Mohns and Cushman collided at the boards. As he started Mohns kicked Cushman's stick. The latter charged Mohns from behind and punched him, Bruins officials said.

After consulting with the linesman referee, Gage Stewart, imposed a 10 ft. penalty upon Cushman. That calls for a \$100 fine.
