The *Miramichi* sailed on Saturday evening for Montreal, having a small freight and Mrs. Captain Cavanagh and family as passengers.

The *Canard* steamer *Leveaux* from Montreal, will not call at this port. She will land Charlottetown freight at Pictou, and it will be forwarded by Island boats.

The steamer *Scud* will sail from Halifax for Magdalen Islands to-day, calling at Pictou, Georgetown and Charlottetown. She takes the place of the *Albert*.

The wholesale and retail cigar and tobacco store of Rubin & Hart, will not be opened until Tuesday next, on account of delay of steamer on Thursday last.

METHODIST CONFERENCE.—The Methodist Conference of New Brunswick and P. E. Island will this year be held in the Queen Square Methodist Church St. John N. B., commencing on the 23rd of June. The Conference at present numbers 97 ministers, and preachers on trial.

RAILWAY APPOINTMENT.—Mr. W. F. Scantlebury, Station Agent at North Wiltshire, has been appointed Relieving Agent of the Railway. This gives promotion to a very efficient and deserving official, and is an appointment to be commended. We understand that Mr. Bell, lately operator in Summerside, will succeed Mr. Scantlebury, at North Wiltshire.

AT THE Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, two young men were each sentenced to thirty days imprisonment for being drunk and disorderly at "Mrs. Campbell's." Two others were sentenced to a like term for frequenting "Mrs. Bwl. McDonald's," and another beauty received the same sentence for being drunk and fighting on the Saturday. The insane man arrested on Saturday was remanded for eight days.

DROWNED.—On Tuesday last a man named Angus McDonald (known as Angus McDonald Tulloch), of East Point, who has been employed at Sawyer's Lobster Establishment, New London, during last year, was drowned while carrying lobster traps from New London to Rustico. The boat capsized. His companion, a man named Praught, clung to it; but he tried to swim ashore, was seized with cramps, and, too far away for Praught to render him assistance—died.

THE SCUTTLING CASE.—This case which has engaged the attention of the court of St. John N. B., for almost fifty days, and which is probably the longest trial on the criminal records of New Brunswick, is nearing its close. On Friday, Chief Justice Allen began his charge to the jury and, after directing their attention to some legal points of a preliminary character, commenced reading the evidence of the principal witnesses. The case will probably close to-day, (Monday.)

A TRUCKMAN came near losing himself and his horse this morning. He was hauling from Peake's No. 2, and in turning drove the horse too near the edge of the wharf where the *Prince Edward* is moored. The horse reared and fell head foremost between the steamer and the wharf, taking with him truck and driver. Mr. John Walsh, mate of the *Prince Edward*, gallantly sprang off the wharf on the horse's back, and in an instant landed the truckman, and quickly secured the horse by a belt and had him hoisted safely on the wharf.

ROBBERY.—Friday night last the shoe-shop of Mr. John Monaghan was robbed of a pair of Wellington boots and a pair of brogans. Joseph Carroll and Terrence McAtee were arrested, charged with the robbery, and tried before the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon. Carroll, on Saturday morning about 6 o'clock—appears from the evidence—tried to sell the Wellington boots to a man named Kelly, who boarded at Mr. Richard Thorne's, and left the boots with Mr. Thorne, saying he would return at 8 o'clock for the money. In the meantime Kelly heard that Mr. Monaghan's store was broken into and, suspecting that Carroll was the party, informed Monaghan where the boots were. Mr. Monaghan went to Thorne's, took charge of the boots, and on Carroll's return he was informed of the fact. He said it was "too thin" and left. In court, this morning, Carroll said he found the boots opposite the Kirk, but as he told a different story to Messrs. Thorne and Kelly, the Magistrate said it was "too thin," and sent Joseph up for four months. McAtee was remanded eight days for evidence.

In voting for myself I did the very best thing I could do under the circumstances; and I believe that the right thinking electors of Ward Four will acknowledge that they are under a debt of gratitude to me.
