

French-Canadians Disagree Over Uranium Sale Details

OTTAWA (CP)—The French government disagrees with Canada's proposals to ensure that any uranium sold to France is used only for peaceful purposes, Trade Minister Sharp said here. The French want the Canadian uranium to generate elec-

trical power, he said in reporting to the Commons on his meetings last week with French officials in Paris.

He said there are two main points of disagreement on the technical aspects of the proposed sale.

One was the "discrimination" involved in demanding guarantees and safeguards from France while continuing long-standing agreements with the United States and Britain that involve no prohibitions.

The other was the form of safeguards. "These matters are under discussion," the minister said. Mr. Sharp said he informed France of Canada's willingness to enter a long-term uranium sale agreement.

"In this respect I think we have the basis for an agreement." His statements were made both at the opening of the afternoon sitting and under questioning by Conservative House Leader Michael Starr.

Mr. Sharp said both sides had agreed to report back to their governments. He had done so Tuesday morning and the government now was considering what steps to take next.

The discussions are reported to involve about 50,000 tons of uranium oxide, possibly worth as much as \$800,000,000.

Opposition Leader Diefenbaker asked whether the government was considering asking Britain and the United States to waive the special immunity they have had since the Second World War to put them on the same basis as France.

"I hope, sir, that these changes are not made . . ."

Mr. Diefenbaker said. In his prepared statement, Mr. Sharp said he told France the proposed sale could be used for peaceful purposes only.

"As the communiqué states, the French government for its part is interested in acquiring Canadian uranium for its civil

program of nuclear reactors for the production of electrical power."

Mr. Sharp said his talks were confined to the general conditions under which a sale could be negotiated and uranium exported by Canadian producers. Prices would be subject to discussions between the producer and French atomic energy authorities.

Board Urges Gov't Operate Bell Telephone

OTTAWA (CP)—The Board of Transport Commissioners has been told that the Bell Telephone Co. of Canada has become too important to the national economy to be left in private hands.

C. S. Jackson, president of the United Electrical Workers Union (Ind.), said Bell should be taken over by the federal government.

"To continue the present arrangements leaves the nation in captivity to Bell with the flow of information under effective alien control," he said.

"No other industrialized country outside of North America submits its vital internal communications system to the control of a private corporation, not to speak of being tied to a foreign corporation."

Mr. Jackson, whose union has about 20,000 members, made his submission as the board resumed its public hearing into Bell's financial operations. The board is studying what changes, if any, should be made in the company's permissive level of earnings.

The Toronto union leader urged the board to reject Bell's proposal that it be allowed a return of seven per cent on total capital investment.

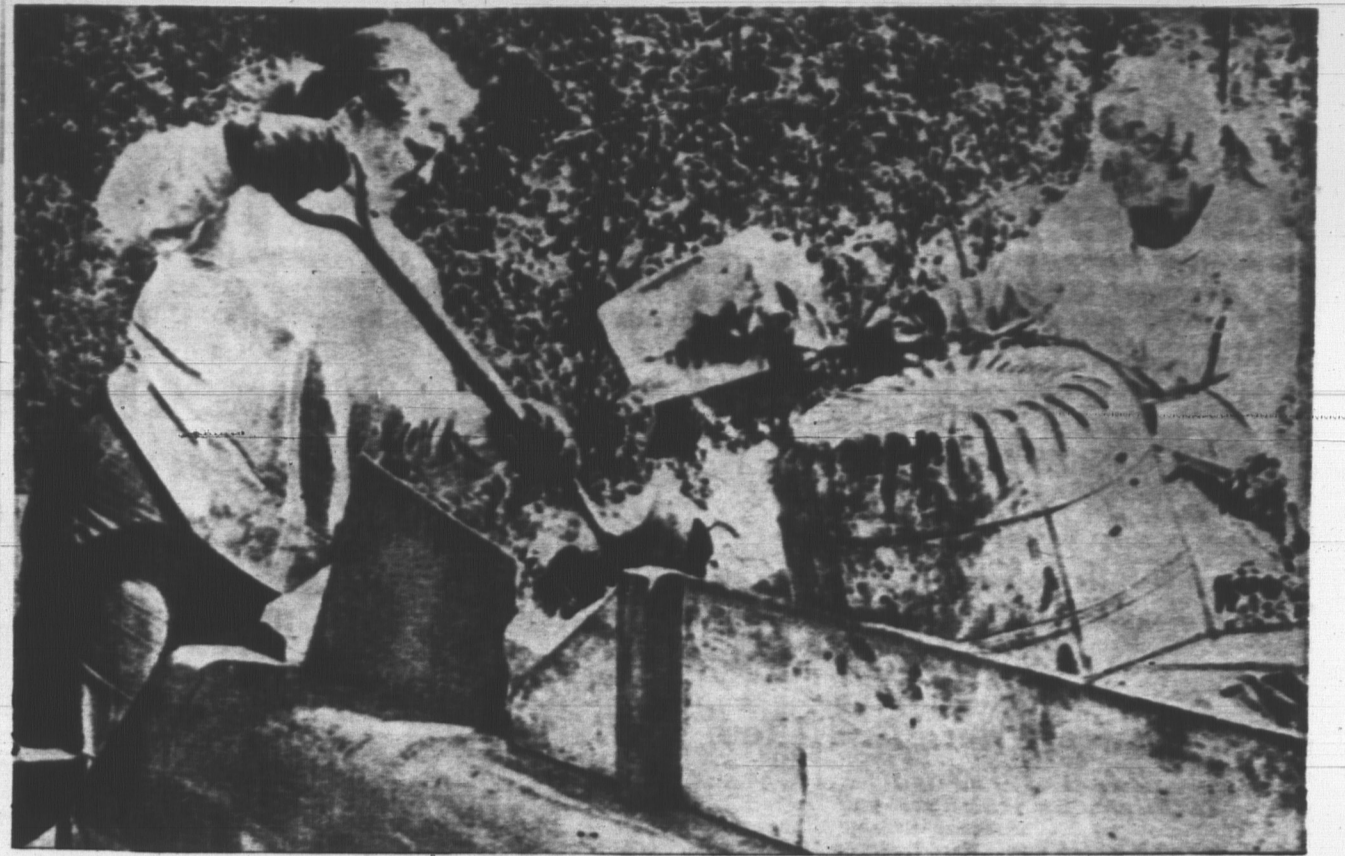

Churches Hold Secret Talks

GENEVA (AP)—The Roman Catholic Church and the World Council of Churches, combining more than 200 Protestant, Anglican and Orthodox churches in 80 countries, have held their first round of secret talks on closer co-operation.

A WCC announcement said the talks were held during the last three days in the joint working group recently set

up by the two bodies. The WCC secretary-general, Dr. W. A. Visser 't Hooft, and Bishop Jan G. M. Willebrands, secretary of the Vatican secretariat for Christian unity, alternated as chairman of the meetings.

As the working group has no authority in itself but reports to the two bodies, details of the discussions were not revealed.

The announcement said the meetings "proceeded in a spirit of Christian understanding, and it became clear that there were many fields of common interest which need to be studied in the future. It was felt particularly that the work of the group should concentrate on the clarification of principles and methods which should guide common ecumenical activities."

No date was announced for the resumption of the talks.

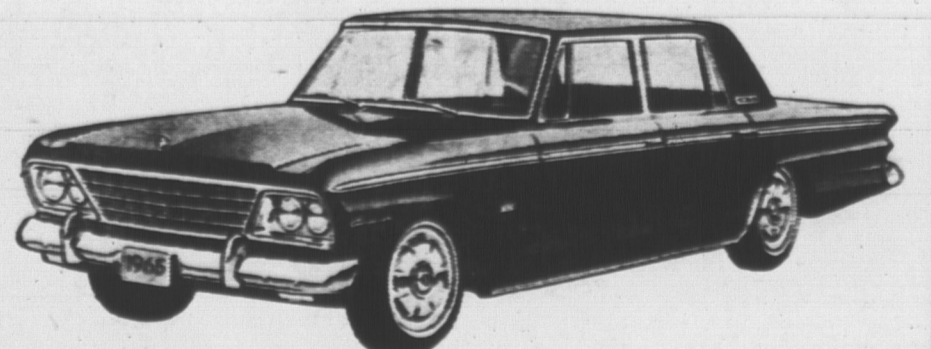
