NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CLOSING OF THE CONGRESS.

Bismarck Satisfied.

Special despatch to Examiner:

BERLIN, July 14. Bismarck in his speech at the closing of the Congress on Saturday, declared that he did not hesitate to affirm that this Congress deserved will of Europe; and that the Plenipotentiaries would have the consciousness of having, as far as was possible, restored and assured peace. He entertained a firm hope that the European understanding would remain durable, and that the cordial relations established among the Plenipotentiaries would consolidate the good relations between their Governments.

Bismarck incidentally remarked that his health was such that he had scarcely hoped to preside over the Congress until its conclusion. Beaconsfield left for home to-day. LONDON, July 13. Reuter's despatch from Constantinople announces that several batteries of artillery and 18 battalions have been sent to Volo. These preparations are designed to be merely a precaution against possible disturbances.

The Rhodope insurgents have exhausted their ammunition and suffer from scarcity of provisions. Differences have broken out among the chiefs, some wishing to accept amnesty.

NEW YORK, July 14.

A Cairo letter says the whole of Egypt is in English hands, including the navy coast guards and everything else. The Khedive might as well abdicate in favor of an English Protectorate, as everything is now done under English dictation.

A Fight Near Montreal.

TWO MEN WOUNDED.

Special Despatch to Examiner:

MONTREAL, July 14.

A mob of French Canadians and Irish attacked, with stones, the train conveying the Sherbrooke and Richmond troops home last night, within three miles of this city, at Tanneries Junction, when the soldiers fired fifty or sixty shots into the crowd—wounding Germain Rolland and Michael Payette, the former in the thigh, the latter in the left breast, but neither fatally.

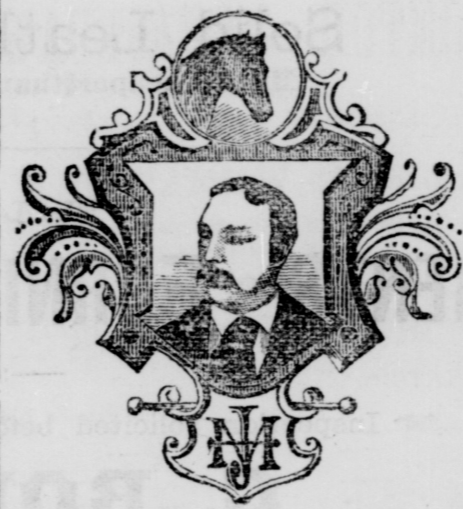
